# June 21st 2009: TWELFTH SUNDAY OF THE YEAR



## WHO IS THIS?

In the Gospel we hear that once when Our Lord and the Apostles were crossing the Lake of Gennesareth, a great storm blew up while Our Lord was asleep in the boat.

The boat was buffeted by wind and waves and was beginning to fill with water. The disciples began to panic. In their terror of impending death they woke Jesus and berated Him, "Don't you care? We're going to drown!" Our Lord's reaction on awaking was simply and immediately to command the storm to cease. Instantly it did so, and the Evangelist tells us "there was a great calm".

What was the disciples' reaction to this amazing event? They were filled with awe. One fear replaced another. If ever we needed an example of the difference between natural fear and supernatural fear, here it is. Fear of the storm's immense fury and destructive force is quite natural. The elements of wind and water in a great storm at sea are truly terrifying. The sense of impending doom can be overwhelming as a man understands only too well how small and powerless he is in the face of such power.

Yet as soon as Our Lord showed His own total authority even over irrational and impersonal forces of nature, a great calm spread over everything. This calm is the complete opposite, or "antithesis" of the storm's

blind, raging fury. It is the calm of order and control, of obedience to the authority that commands even the irrational forces of nature. In that sudden stillness the disciples were overwhelmed by the uncanny awesomeness of what their Master had done without any effort, but simply by willing it. He didn't need to command the storm by word or gesture. He did so for the important reason that He wanted the disciples to know that the sudden end to this great storm—strange enough in itself—was not a mere coincidence. It was His doing. He wanted them to understand that though He was a man like them, He was also much, much more as well.

No wonder, then, that they were filled with awe. This is a supernatural fear, the "fear of the Lord", which is utterly different from fear of any other kind. When we ask God the Holy Spirit for His spiritual gift of "fear of the Lord" we are asking for *this* kind of fear, awe in God's presence, a sense of His majestic authority and His total providence. God's authority as the Creator does not cease with the act of creation. In other words, the universe does not simply go on moving under its own self-determined rules. What is true for one small part of nature is true for all. When the astronauts who landed on the moon looked back on the earth in the distance, they saw a beautiful, yet really quite tiny ball suspended in the amazing vastness of space. It was a sight to make anyone giddy. Is that planet which makes us feel both so secure and also yet so small really itself so tiny and insubstantial? Lake Gennesareth is not really so big, though big enough to terrify a boatful of men to fear of death! This planet on which we live is infinitesimally small when seen in the context of the visible universe beyond the sky.

And yet even all that is under God's *complete* authority. That is the challenge Our Lord puts before us today. Do we believe that He is really in control of the universe? Much more importantly, do we believe that He orders everything to our final good? The first reading today comes from the final part of the Old Testament Book of Job, when Almighty God tells Job and his friends the truth about His awesome power. We cannot understand it all. Ultimately, God is beyond our comprehension and we must accept that. But He is not so far beyond our powers of understanding that we cannot recognise with awe and wonder His providential love for us.

Our Lord's final words to the disciples - "Why are you afraid? Have you no faith?"- are not so much a rebuke as an invitation. It is as though He says to them: "See now what I can do for you. Therefore put your trust in me. But remember that you must trust me in order to receive what I have to give." God is infinitely powerful and loving. In His love for us He invites us to trust in Him. He does not "control" the world and the cosmos as we might try to do, by tweaking now one thing, now another. He allows us to live out our lives yet to learn to call on Him for help when we need Him, if we will accept Him.

St John Fisher (1459-1535) Bishop of Rochester and friend of Thomas More, he was the only one of the English Catholic bishops who refused to take the Oath of Supremacy, or to acknowledge Henry VIII's divorce from Catherine of Aragon.

St Thomas More (1478-1535) Chancellor of England and friend of the King's until their fall-out over Henry's divorce and the Oath of Supremacy, he died "...the King's good servant, but God's first". The Roman Martyrology says: "These two men were beheaded for the Catholic Faith and for the primacy of blessed Peter and the Bishop of Rome". They are depicted above the English Martyrs' altar (by the Baptistery)

Tuesday 23rd June: Feria. (Green) Optional memoria of St Etheldreda, Abbess. (White) St Thomas Garnet, English Martyr.

**St Etheldreda** (d. 679) An Anglo-Saxon princess, she became a nun after having been twice widowed. She founded a double monastery at Ely, and following her death Ely became an important place of pilgrimage due to the many miracles attributed to her. The present cathedral stands on the site of her monastery.

**St Thomas Garnet** (d. 1608) As a secular priest he was imprisoned for nine months and then exiled. In France, he joined the Jesuits at Louvain but returned to minister in England. He was soon caught and charged for being a priest and although he could have escaped punishment by taking the oath of allegiance to the crown, he refused and was hanged drawn and quartered at Tyburn.

St Cyril of Alexandria Patriarch of Alexandria in Egypt, he was appointed by the Pope to preside over the Council of Ephesus in 431, at which Our Lady was declared Theotókos", that is "Mother of God", thereby condemning the popular heresy promulgated by Nestorius that She was the mother only of Christ the Man.
