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1th 2010: OCTAVE OF EASTER: DIVINE MERCY SUNDAY



MEETING THE RISEN LORD


The Gospel of the first Sunday, or "eighth day", after Easter, recounts the events both of the first Easter Day and of the same day at the beginning of the following week, as the Apostles experienced them, and as St. John the Evangelist tells us what took place.

On the evening of that first day of the week, the very day when Jesus rose from the dead, most of the Apostles had been huddled together, locked away in the Upper Room where they had met under such different circumstances the previous Thursday evening to celebrate the Last Supper Passover meal with their Master. Now they were together again, or most of them at any rate, but only for "fear of the Jews". What had happened to their Lord would probably happen to them, too, if the Chief Priests could lay their hands on them. They were marked men. Jesus had finally been put to death as a supposed rebel. How could His followers not face a similar fate if they were caught?

They were far from being pleased at the news they had heard that morning, about the tomb where Jesus had been laid two nights ago now being strangely empty. Although St. John tells us that he saw the empty tomb for himself and "he believed" that Jesus was not dead any more, he was apparently alone in this faith among the remaining eleven Apostles; (don't forget that one of their number had just committed suicide).

So when Jesus suddenly appeared in their presence, they were dumbfounded. They even thought they were seeing a ghost. But Jesus showed them He was flesh and blood by eating in their presence. Yet it was not only Judas who was no longer with them—Thomas also was not present on that evening. We do not know why he was absent. What matters is what happened next. Not surprisingly, when Thomas returned to join the others in the Upper Room, he refused to believe them when they said "we have seen the Lord!" We know what followed—how Jesus came back again and singled Thomas out and showed him that He was, indeed, truly alive, body and soul together. We also know Thomas's profound exclamation of faith, which we also love to make our own at Mass: "My Lord and my God!"

But one special fact might otherwise be overlooked in these events: both these meetings between Our Lord and His Apostles took place on the first day of two successive weeks. Therefore we can see that it is Our Lord who has established the pattern so deeply grounded in the Church's life—that we come together as members of His mystical body in order especially to meet Him, on the first day of every week- Sunday. It is Our Lord, therefore, who has made this day so holy, that we even observe it as a divine command, to come together to meet Him on this day by taking part in Holy Mass.



During Paschaltide, instead of the *Angelus*, we pray Our Lady's Easter Antiphon:

REGINA CAELI

Joy to you, O Queen of Heaven, Alleluia! He whom you were fit to bear, Alleluia! As He promised has arisen, Alleluia! Pour for us to God your prayer, Alleluia!

Let us pray: O God, who have graciously given joy to the world in the resurrection of your Son, Our Lord Jesus Christ; grant, we pray, that through His mother the Virgin Mary, we may attain to the joys of everlasting life. Through Christ our Lord. Amen.
