WHAT IS CAESAR'S AND WHAT IS GOD'S?

When Our Lord uttered those memorable words we hear in today's Gospel "Give back to Caesar what is Caesar's and to God what is God's", He was answering a trick question posed by the Pharisees: "Is it lawful to pay taxes to the Roman Emperor?" But why exactly was this a trick question? We have to remember that the Holy Land was under Roman occupation. The Romans were, of course, gentiles and pagans. Therefore the Jews considered them not only as foreigners, but as defiling the holy places by their presence. The Romans were not the first foreign power to control the Holy Land; a couple of centuries earlier the Antiochene Emperors,, followers of Alexander the Great of Macedon, had ruled the whole Middle East and tried to impose paganism on the Jews, provoking a great and ultimately successful armed revolt under the Maccabees, which we can read about in the final books of the Old Testament. The memory of this revolt, which restored the worship of God in the Temple of Jerusalem, re-

mained very much at the heart of the "zealots" of Our Lord's time, men who actively strove to resist pagan Roman rule both in the name of true religion and of Jewish political freedom. As so often, religion and politics were deeply intertwined for the zealots.

So the question posed by the Pharisees was fraught with danger for Our Lord. If He said "Yes, it is lawful to pay taxes", then He ran the danger of appearing to give support to Roman rule as a collaborator and thus alienating the religious Jews. On the other hand, if He answered: "No; it is against God's Law to pay taxes to the pagans", then He ran the danger of being openly identified as a rebel, and thus liable to arrest and even execution. Of course, we remember that, although untrue, this charge that He was leading a revolt against Caesar was actually made by the Chief Priests against Our Lord before Pilate.

Our Lord's answer is masterful. Not only does He neatly sidestep the trap set for Him, but He also gives us a principle to follow: that we are obliged to respect and assist the proper exercise of civil authority even if this is pagan. It is a teaching that St. Peter and St. Paul will take up and develop in their Letters. In his Letter to the Romans St. Paul tells us: "You must obey all governing authorities. Since all government comes from God, the civil authorities were appointed by God, and so anyone who resists authority is rebelling against God's decision." Of course, this may at first seem to give approval to any authority, however corrupt; but St. Paul makes clear the suppositions on which his argument rests: "The state is there to serve God for your benefit. The authorities are there to serve God: they carry our God's revenge by punishing wrongdoers". So St. Paul leaves room to allow 'conscientious resistance' to anything the civil authorities may enact which is directly contrary to God's Law. St. Paul also turns specifically to Our Lord's point in the Gospel: "This is the reason also why you must pay taxes, since all government officials are God's officers. They serve God by collecting taxes. Pay every government official what he has a right to ask-whether it be direct tax or indirect, fear or honour." (Rom 13:1-7) St. Peter says: "For the sake of the Lord, accept the authority of every social institution" The underlying reason for this is to confound the enemies of the Faith who accuse us of justifying disobedience if the civil authorities do not share our religion: "God wants you to be good citizens, so as to silence what fools are saying in their ignorance." (1 Pet 2: 13-15) Obeying the civil kw and paying taxes therefore are a contribution that we should make to the common good of society, as long as they do not infringe God's Law.

Over the years this Parish and congregation have been remarkably generous givers to the Pope's Mission Society, the "Association for the Propagation of the Faith" (APF). Well done, but please keep this tradition going! If you have not already got a "Red Box" then please ask for one today. If you already have one, keep filling it up and encouraging others to do the same. By the way, we should especially help our children to learn to put a little into the family's Red Box. We can never be too young to learn to be generous to those in need. Not only should we train our children to give money to the Collection at Mass, (even if we give them the money in the first place), but also to the Missions, thus giving "back to God what is God's" as Our Lord teaches us today. But even if we already do all those things, there is still more that needs doing—When you have filled your box, the Promoters collect it and make sure that it is counted and sent on to the Missions, and that you get an empty box to fill up again. St John of Capistrano (1385-1456) Educated in law at Perugia University, he was working in the Courts at Naples when the King appointed him Governor of Perugia. A war with a neighbouring town led to his imprisonment and on his release, he joined the Franciscans under the direction of St Bernadine of Siena, who inspired him to preach devotion to the Holy Name of Jesus. A gifted orator, he travelled extensively through middle and eastern Europe preaching penance and establishing several communities of Franciscan renewal. At the age of seventy, Pope Callistus III asked him to preach and lead a Crusade against Mohammed II who, having already conquered Constantinople, was leading an army of invading Turks intent on capturing Rome. The battle was won at Belgrade in 1456. St john died later that year. He is the patron saint of jurors.

St Anthony Mary Claret (1807-70) He was the son of a Spanish weaver. He had hoped to become a Jesuit, but poor health prevented this and he became a secular priest. In 1849, he founded the Missionary Sons of the Immaculate Heart of Mary (*Claretians*). At the request of Queen Isabella, he was appointed Archbishop of Santiago in Cuba, but opposition to his reforms from the liberals within the Church, led to several assassination attempts on his life and so Isabella recalled him to be her chaplain. This enabled him to continue his missionary work and he established specialist educational establishments. In 1869 he participated in the first Vatican Council. He was said to have had the gift of prophecy and to have performed miracles during his life.
