CHRIST GIVES POWER TO HIS APOSTLES

The Gospel reminds us how our Lord did not only work miracles Himself, but also gave the same powers He possessed to His Apostles. Thus they were able to drive out the devil and to heal the sick by anointing them with oil. The Apostles, too, shared this power with those upon whom they laid their hands in ordination, whom we call bishops and priests. This tells us the important truth that the Church is not merely the body of *Christ's followers* in all times and places, but is the *Mystical Body of Christ Himself*, endowed with His power in the Sacraments.

Blessing with St Philip's relic at 8 p.m.

St Henry (972-1024) Born in Bavaria, he was crowned Holy Roman Emperor in 955 becoming Henry II (not to be confused with Henry II of England who was responsible for the death of St Thomas à Becket). Although a temporal and political leader, he was a humble and prayerful man, very concerned with the welfare of the Church and he assisted the Benedictines in the restoration of ecclesiastical and social discipline. With his wife Cunegund (also canonised) he did much to care for the needy and poor.

Tuesday 14th July: Feria. (Green) Optional memoria of St Camillus of Lellis, Priest. (White)

Benediction at 8 p.m.

St Camillus of Lellis (1550-1614) Having led a vicious and dissolute life as a soldier, he heard a sermon which changed his life. His own physical sufferings drew him to volunteer to help the sick, but he was shocked at the state of the hospitals and the brutality with which patients were treated. He became a penitent of St Philip Neri who advised him to become a priest. He found the Camillans to care for the sick, and they were the first recorded medical unit sent to assist troops. Despite great sufferings, he continued to tend the sick until his death.

Wednesday 15th July: St Bonaventure, Bishop & Doctor of the Church. Memoria.

St Bonaventure (1221-74) As child he had been cured by St Francis of Assisi who exclaimed "O buono ventura!" ("good fortune"), hence his adopted name. He joined the Franciscans and was a renowned theologian becoming Cardinal Bishop of Albano.

Thursday 16th July: Feria. (Green) Optional memoria of Our Lady of Mount Carmel. (White)

Our Lady of Mount Carmel commemorates the establishment in the Middle Ages of Christian hermitages on Mount Carmel in the Holy Land under our Lady's protection.

Friday 17th July: Feria. (Green). Optional memorias of St Kenelm. (White); or of Bls John Sugar and Robert Grissold, Martyrs. (Red)

St Kenelm (c. 800) Mentioned in the Canterbury tales, this prince of Mercia was reputedly martyred at Clent where a church is dedicated to him.

Bl John Sugar Born in Wombourne and raised an Anglican, he refused to take the Oath of Supremacy although preaching against the Catholic Church until his conversion. Following ordination, he worked among the poor Catholics in the Midlands, going about on foot. Bl Robert Grissold was his faithful servant and they were eventually both arrested at Baddesley Clinton. They were martyred together at Warwick on the Feast of Our Lady of Mount Carmel, 1604.
