

CARDINAL NEWMAN TO BE BEATIFIED The Provost writes:

Many of you reading this will already be aware of the great news which reached us on Friday last, July 3^d. That morning, in Rome, Pope Benedict XVI authorised the issuing of a Decree recognising the authenticity of a miracle obtained through the intercession of Cardinal Newman.

The miraculous event took place in August 2001, when a permanent Deacon of the Archdiocese of Boston, USA, named Jack Sullivan, was cured of a crippling disease of the spine. His prayer to Newman had been prolonged and intense and finally on that August day, the prayer was answered. Careful investigation into the event, undertaken by both doctors and the ologians, led to the conclusion that what had happened could not be explained in terms of medical science, and could be ascribed to Cardinal Newman's intercession. That verdict was accepted last month by the Cardinals and Prelates of the Congregation for the Causes of Saints in Rome, and on Friday by the Pope himself.

People all around the world have greeted this news with great joy and thanksgiving. It is the culmination of fifty years' work, centred here at the Birmingham Oratory, which has involved so many people, many known to us personally, and not a few no longer with us here on earth.

What happens next? Various conversations will take place in order to fix both a date and a place for the ceremony of Beatific ation. Given that summer holidays are now beginning, it may be a few weeks before these important decisions can be made. Once the ceremony has taken place, Cardinal Newman becomes "Blessed John Henry Newman" and he will have his own feast day in the Church's calendar, as well as special prayers and readings for his proper Mass and Office.

The significance of what is to happen is huge. Cardinal Newman has long been admired by people around the world, whether for the beauty of his prose, his deep theological and philosophical writings, his inspiring sermons and poetry. By beatifying him, Pope Benedict is holding up to the whole Church the life and teachings of Cardinal Newman as a sure guide for us to follow, and

as an inspiration for the Church today. Cardinal Newman foresaw many of the problems that both church and Society have to contend with in our day and age. He will be an authentic teacher for the Church in a new way now that he is to receive the 'honours of the altar'.

We should regard it as an enormous privilege to be able to come to the Oratory he founded, to walk in the spots where he walked, and to be in a very special way heirs to his great tradition. In the months to come this Oratory will be a worldwide focus of attention and there will be much work to be done as we prepare for the great day of the Beatification. Please keep the Fathers in your prayers at this time and especially thank God for the enormous grace He has bestowed on us through His faithful servant, John Henry Newman : **Te Deum Laudamus**!

St Maria Goretti (1890-1902) Born in Ancona, Italy her father died of malaria and her mother struggled to feed her children. Maria was a pious girl and when a neighbour attempted to rape her, she said she would prefer to die than to lose her virginity. He stabbed her several times but before she died she forgave him. In prison, he was unremorseful until Maria appeared to him in a dream. He awoke a • changed man, and lived out his remaining prison term completely reformed. When Maria was canonised in 1950, her attacker was present at the ceremony in St Peter's.

St Augustine Zhao Rong & Comps The freedom to practice Christianity in China has since earliest times, depended mainly on its relations with the outside world and the Church has been actively persecuted at various times. Augustine (1746-1815) was originally a soldier and following his conversion, he became a diocesan priest. Emperor Kia-Kin issued harsh decrees against Christians and Fr Augustine was arrested and cruelly tortured before his execution. On this day, we also remember the other 119 Catholic Chinese martyrs between 1648 and 1930.

St Benedict (c 480-530) Born of Italian nobility, he was sent to Rome to finish his education but observing the lax lives of his fellow students, he was drawn to live away from the world of pagan wars and vice, and giving away his wealth, went to live as a hermit. As his reputation for holiness grew others joined him and he set up communities, notably at Subiaco where he lived most of his life, and at Montecassino, (where he is buried). The rule of life he established was eventually adopted as the model for most of the monastic houses and Orders of the Western Church, and remains the rule followed by most monks. As a result of the enormous influence of Benedictine monks in European history, both spiritually and as those who preserved ancient civilisation through the Dark Ages, Benedict was the first saint to be declared "Patron of Europe".
