December 14th 2008: THE THIRD SUNDAY OF ADVENT "GAUDETE"



REJOICE IN THE LORD!

In the Gospel John the Baptist continues to give witness to Christ by telling those sent to him by the Chief Priests that though he is not himself the Messiah (the "Christ" or the "Anointed One"), the Messiah does already stand in their midst, "unknown to them". John has prepared the way for the Messiah both by his preaching and his baptising. He tells the messengers from Jerusalem that the true Messiah will baptise not merely with water, but with the Holy Spirit.

St. Paul, in the second reading (which is taken from the first Epistle to the Thessalonians), encourages us to "be joyful at all times". This is not the same as the secular call: "Don't worry; be happy!" The call to Christian joyfulness is made in the Entrance Antiphon whose first word "Gaudete!" (rejoice!) has given this Sunday its name. It is a spiritual gift and quality and is not incompatible with some difficulties in life and even pain and sorrow. This is clear from Our Lord's teaching in the Beatitudes: "Blessed are those who mourn, for they shall be com-

forted", and "Blessed are you when men revile you and speak all kinds of calumny against you on my account—rejoice and be glad...!"

True Christian rejoicing means a profound, and not a superficial joy. It is seen in the difference between those, on the one hand, who know the inner peace which comes from closeness to God and the doing of His Will at any cost, and on the other hand those who *only* seek entertainment and distraction from the tedium or problems of their daily lives in shops, bars and clubs. As Christmas draws nearer, there are so many people in the latter category. For us, the call to "rejoice" is the invitation to find the God of peace in our preparations for His coming at Christmas. It's not that God doesn't want us to enjoy Christmas, rather that He wants us to enjoy His Son's coming, for which we can only prepare by keeping this Advent as a time of prayer and sacramental practice, above all Mass and confession. What a terrible shame it is when Catholics are eager to go out partying on Saturday night but cannot be bothered to go to Sunday Mass!

Rejoicing in the Lord is only possible when we remain *watchful*, as we were reminded on the First Sunday of Advent. We must be vigilant over ourselves— being careful of the way in which we spend our time—watching the kind of thoughts and actions we allow ourselves to indulge. Being watchful means staying alert—not allowing ourselves to waste valuable time and opportunities to grow in love of God and neighbour. Prayer is essential here, and don't forget to make at least one good confession for Christmas!

O, THAT YOU WOULD COME QUICKLY!

For many people looking over the page at 17th December onwards, the appearance of short passages beginning with "O" will be puzzling. What are they? There are seven of them altogether, each allocated to a day in the last week before Christmas. They are all "Antiphons" - short passages which both precede and follow the singing or recitation of the Canticle of Our Lady known as the "Magnificat", which the Church sings at Vespers each day. Each of these antiphons is a prayer of longing—(hence the cry: "O!" which begins each of them). The Church longs for Christ her Saviour to come and set her free from sin, from oppression, from the darkness of waiting in a world which has abandoned God and has got lost deeper and deeper in sin. These antiphons are very ancient and by long tradition are sung solemnly on each of the last seven evenings leading up to Christmas Eve. We will actually sing the fifth of these, "O Oriens" at Vespers on the Fourth Sunday. That antiphon calls Christ the "Rising Sun", reminding us on the shortest day that although it is the darkest time of year, the light will now gradually return, albeit imperceptibly at first. That sign gives us hope that in the darkest moments of human life, God is still present, though hidden and imperceptible to all but the faithful.

In a country like ours which has turned its back on God and on the Church He founded, this time of darkness and waiting is very real for us. These seven short prayers can be the heart of our own prayer to Christ each day of the last week before Christmas. As the prophet Isaiah said in last Sunday's reading: "O, that you (God) would tear open the heavens and come down!" Isaiah also knew the heartache of waiting during a time when the Chosen People, had forgotten God and turned their backs on religion. We must take heart from Our Lord's words to the Apostles: "Blessed are your eyes, for they see what many prophets bnged to see, and never saw it!" All that the Apostles saw and heard, we can see and hear when we receive the Sacraments carefully and reverently.

Bl. Anthony Grassi (1592-1671) He joined the Oratorians in Fermo, Italy at the age of seventeen and soon proved himself to be a student of fine intellect. As a young priest, he was struck by lightning whilst praying at the shrine of Our Lady of Loretto, to whom he had a special devotion. Grateful for his recovery, he considered his life now belonged entirely to God. Renowned for his serenity, he became a sought-after confessor and adviser, even to cardinals. Despite his obvious humility, he kept the Oratorian constitutions, and once he became Provost, ensured that his community did likewise. He was considered to be truly like St Philip Neri.

CHRISTMAS STAMPS: The Daily Telegraph reported on Saturday that, just as many of you have already discovered, complaints are coming in from all over the country that religious stamps cannot easily be found. However, it is still possible to order these stamps online from Royal Mail. Enter "Royal Mail" in your search engine, click on "Christmas at Royal Mail", but be warned—DO NOT click on "Christmas Stamps"! Instead look for "shop" in the "top links" menu. Now click on "stamp sheets" and scroll right down to the very bottom (!) to find the religious Christmas stamps which you can only order in sheets of 50. Talk about making things difficult!
