

October 12th 2008: THE TWENTY-EIGHTH SUNDAY OF THE YEAR



THANKS, GOD, BUT 'NO THANKS'!

Today's Gospel is another parable in which Our Lord warns His own people not to take their status as God's Chosen People too much for granted. Last Sunday's Gospel was the stern warning of the Wicked Tenants who killed the Landowner's son. Today Our Lord puts the same message in quite another form. A King (God the Father) invites His friends (the Jewish People) to a Marriage Feast for His Son (Heaven). As soon as everything has been prepared the King sends out his servants (the Prophets) to tell those invited to come to the Feast. But they just can't be bothered and make excuses. They are too interested in their businesses and their farms, and some go so far as to maltreat, and even to kill the messengers. Then the King, in his anger, cancels the invitation to those ungrateful people and sends out other servants to invite anyone they can find in the streets, tramps, cripples, waifs and strays—all sorts of people who would never have been thought "worthy" of an invitation in the first place. These willingly ac-

cept the invitation. Being poor and despised, they are only too grateful to be invited to a great feast. In these people Our Lord invites us to see the gentiles who are called into God's Church because the Chosen people had rejected Him.

Yet, just as in the Gospel last week, we should be far from complacent at hearing this message. We, the gentiles, are indeed the fortunate ones who have been invited to the Wedding Feast, i.e. to belong to Christ and His Church on earth and so find the way to heaven. This invitation to us has come about providentially because of the rejection of Christ by His own people, the Jews. Yet what was true of them in Our Lord's time on earth is also true of us, here and now.

Just think how the "Christian" countries of the world are, by and large, among the wealthiest today: America, Europe, Australasia. But how truly Christian are these countries now? Isn't it the case that we who live in what was once the heartland of Christendom are now the most godless of all people in the modern world? It is the West which has abandoned faith in God and practise of religion. This abandonment of faith in God is called "apostasy". Apostasy is not just *indifferent* to God—it is *vehemently* anti-God and anti-life. It is the "Christian" West which pioneers anti-life technology and legislation and then imposes this on the poorer world through instruments like the United Nations and the World Banks. The modern western world, which has for centuries enjoyed the privileges of the Catholic Faith, has now rejected it and either mocks, or even actively persecutes, the faith which made it once great and spiritually wealthy. The truth is that, having once been the poor waifs and strays grateful to be invited into God's kingdom, we are now the ones who spurn His invitations. When we stop coming to Mass every Sunday—when we count our leisure time as more important than the time we give to God—when we allow our children to spend time in activities which get in the way of going to Sunday Mass—when we decide we know better than the Church what is right and good for us—when we ignore the invitation to come and worship our Lord in the Blessed Sacrament, as for instance in the Forty Hours last week—in all these ways we share in the apostasy of our modern western world. Like the people in Our Lord's parable today, we have been blinded by our businesses, our wealth, our technology. We have lost the sense of God and of our being called to eternal life by Him in Christ's Church.

So let the present financial crisis be a wake -up call to us all! Wealth is unreal. Only God is real. Here is what the Pope has to say about this at the opening of the Synod of Bishops in Rome last week: "We see now in the fall of the great banks, this money disappears; it is nothing -- and in the same way, all these things, which lack a true reality to depend on, and are elements of a second order. The word of God is the basis of everything, it is the true reality. And to be realists, we should count on this reality. We should change our idea that matter, solid things, things we touch, are the most solid and secure reality."

The Pope notes how our Lord spoke of the two possibilities of building a house on the sand or on a firm rock. "He who builds only on things that are visible and tangible, on success, a career, money -- he is building on sand. Apparently these are the true realities, but one day they will pass away, and in this way, all these things that do not have a true reality to count on. He who builds his house on these realities, on material things, on success, on everything that seems to be, builds on sand. Only the Word of God is the foundation of all reality; it is stable like the heavens and more than the heavens. It is the reality. Therefore we should change our concept of realism. The realist is he who recognizes in the Word of God, in this reality apparently so fragile, the basis of everything."
