# October 3rd 2010: THE TWENTY-SEVENTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME



## **MIRACLES: FAITH AND WORKS**

The Apostles ask Our Lord to "increase our faith!" His reply is "if your faith were even as meagre as a tiny seed, you could tell a tree to uproot itself and be planted in the sea, and it would obey you!".

Before asking ourselves what Our Lord means by this answer, we need to find out what the Apostles mean by their question. At first it may seem that they are asking for faith in God, i.e. belief in Him. But it is not so much belief in God that they want as *trust* in Him to help them to work miracles, as Our Lord's words to them show us.

It seems from Our Lord's reply that the Apostles are eager to work miracles. If we cast our minds back to the beginning of chapter 10 in St. Luke's Gospel, there were seventy two disciples sent by Our Lord to preach in His name, who came back rejoicing that they had not only preached in His name, but had worked many miracles in His name. On that occasion Our Lord had warned them not to glory in miracles, but rather to rejoice that their "names were written in the Book of Life".

He goes on to tell a parable to the Twelve at this point, about the servant who, after ploughing his Master's fields must still serve his Master's meal before himself being allowed to eat. "Must the master be grateful to his servant for doing what he was told to do?" This parable only makes sense if it refers to the Apostles' motive in wanting to work miracles. They reme mbered the seventy two coming back rejoicing from their miracles, and maybe they wanted to do the same so as to get some credit among the people.

Hence Our Lord's warning. Just as He had told the seventy two disciples to "rejoice instead that your names are written in the Book of Life", so now He says that the Twelve should not look for glory if they do any great works in Christ's name. If they are doing what they have been told to do, should they expect any praise? Aren't they just like servants who cannot expect to be praised for doing their duty, even if that duty is hard!

So with the Twelve, He says, don't ask for the kind of faith that will help you to work miracles if you only want it for your own glory. That will do you no good, and you won't be able to work such miracles anyway! Only a desire simply to do God's will leads to working miracles.

But do miracles really happen? They still do, though rarely! Or at least that is how it seems to most of us. That is because it is easy to look for the wrong kind of thing. We can sometimes be aware of situations which seem impossible to turn out well, and yet they do. This can be miraculous, though not sensational. Sensational miracles are certainly rare.

For instance, we have waited so many years for a miracle to show us that Cardinal Newman is among the saints in heaven. We have had to overcome not only impatience, but also unbelief. It is not without significance that the miracle that brought about the beatification came not from this country but from America. So too, we are investigating a miracle that could lead to his canonisation—again, in the continent of America. If only we had more faith, we might obtain more miracles! We must pray to Blessed John Henry for an increase in faith and in good works—to help us be better witnesses and Apostles in our own time, as Blessed John Henry was in his.

Monday 4th October: St Francis of Assisi, Deacon. Memoria. (White)

**St Francis of Assisi** (d.1226) As a rich young man, Francis heard God's call to him to "rebuild my Church", so renouncing his father's great wealth he became a beggar, gathering many followers who shared his love of holy poverty. Thus, the Friars Minor or "Franciscans" were founded and in 1212, with St Clare, the Poor Clares. Twice he made abortive attempts to be a missionary to the Moslems. He received the Stigmata on 14th September 1224, two years before his death. He was canonised in 1228.

Tuesday 5th October: St Luigi Scrosoppi, Oratorian Priest. Memoria. (White)

**St Luigi Scrosoppi** (1804-1884) He became an Oratorian in his home city of Udine, North-Eastern Italy. Like his contemporary fellow Oratorian, Blessed John Henry, Cardinal Newman, his life spanned almost the entire 19th century, a time of great turmoil for Italy and the Church. He saw his Oratory suppressed firstly by Napoleon's French revolutionary forces, then restored, only to be suppressed permanently by the anti-clerical forces of Italian nationalism. P. Luigi bore these trials with great fortitude and succeeded in founding two religious orders of sisters to serve the poor and needy.

**St Bruno** (d. 1101) Founder of the Carthusians, the most austere of all monastic orders, he was a man of great humility, refusing several requests to become a bishop until Pope Urban II, a former pupil asked him to go to Rome as his adviser.

**Blessed John Henry Newman** was received on this date in 1845 into "the One Fold of the Redeemer" as he referred to the Catholic Church in his letters to friends announcing the news. It was an extraordinary act of faith made by one of the most influential Anglicans of his day, in which he lost not only status but friends and family, many of whom never spoke or wrote to him again. But he found peace in following God's light.
