

May 10th 2009: THE FIFTH SUNDAY OF EASTER

THE FORTY DAYS' TEACHING



If we have now moved on to a time beyond Christ's death and resurrection, why are we returning to the teaching Our Lord gave before His death? Is it simply because there are too few indications of what kind of teaching Our Lord did in fact give His Apostles after Easter? Not exactly. It is true that there is little in the Gospels to tell us what Our Lord said during the days between Easter and His Ascension to heaven. Yet that is not the main reason for returning to the Last Supper discourse.

The key is to be found in the Last Supper itself. There Our Lord told His Apostles: "I still have many things to say to you, but they would be too much for you now" (Jn 16:12) The Apostles could not take in everything Our Lord had to say on that momentous night. Neither can we. That is why, for instance, we keep the feast of Corpus Christi after the end of Eastertide, because we could not take in all the wonderful implications of the Mass, the Priesthood and the Blessed Sacrament on the night of their institution, as events rush headlong into the Arrest, the trial and the Passion and death of Our Lord. We need to return to them with time to ponder their depths.

The Apostles also needed to do exactly the same as we do with all that Our Lord had said on that night. It was indeed "too much for them" then, as Our Lord had warned them. St. John wrote His Gospel over many long years of reflection and prayer. He was the youngest of the Apostles, and the last one to die as a very old man around the year 100 A.D. His gospel was the last fruit of his lifetime of pondering on the wonderful mysteries he had been called to witness, and of the teachings he had himself heard from Our Lord's lips. We know that he had not done this alone, but had spent many of those later years praying with our Lady, whose protector he had become at the foot of the cross (Jn. 19:26-27). Her own lifetime of 'pondering on these things" (Lk 2: 19 and 51) had enabled her to share the fruits of her contemplation with St. John. He in turn passed these on to his own followers, who bore witness to the truth of his teaching at the very end of the Gospel (Jn. 21:24).

St. John, therefore, in His account of the Last Supper, writes under the inspiration of the Holy Spirit, Who, Our Lord said, "will guide you into the complete truth" (Jn 16:13). When St. John recalls Our Lord's teaching on that great night, given at the first Holy Mass, he remembers it all in the light of the resurrection and the outpouring of the Holy Spirit which were the fruit of that sacrifice. Hence St. John's account can be seen to be a distillation of all Our Lord's final teachings to His Apostles, from the Last Supper and from the Forty Days which followed the Resurrection.

CHRIST IS THE VINE

So today, therefore, Our Lord describes Himself as "the Vine" in an image drawn from chapter 15 of St. John's Gospel. New stems can be grafted onto an older stock and the new will draw nourishment from the old. So it is that we are grafted onto Christ and so, as St. Paul says, "it is no longer I that live, but Christ that lives in me" (Galatians 2:20) It is by Christ's own blood that we are fed and nourished in the Sacrament of Holy Communion. For we receive Him whole and entire, Body, Blood, Soul and Divinity, whenever we receive Holy Communion either under the form of bread or under the form of wine. He is fully present in either.

Sts Nereus & Achilleus These Roman soldiers were martyred in 304 for converting to Christianity. St Philip Neri himself received their relics with joy on the occasion of the consecration of the Roman Oratory, the *Chiesa Nuova*, where they are still revered.

St Pancras Also martyred in 304 during the persecution of the Church by the Emperor Diocletian, he became a very popular saint in England after St Augustine of Canterbury dedicated a church in Canterbury to him, though little is known of his life. The London railway station named after him was built on the site of another church which had been dedicated to him.

Our Lady of Fatima: In 1917, Our Lady appeared on six consecutive occasions, from May to October, to three shepherd children in Fatima, at a small place called the *Cova d' Iria* (Cave of Peace) She exhorted that people make sacrifices, do penance, and pray for world peace and the conversion of sinners. Referring to herself as the "Lady of the Rosary", she particularly urged that we should all say the Rosary every day.

Thursday, 14th May: St Matthias, Apostle. Feast. (Red))

• May Devotions at 7.45 p.m.

St Matthias: He was elected by the Apostles, by lot, to replace Judas Iscariot. He had been a follower of Our Lord and of the Apostles and was a witness to the truth of the Resurrection. He was also present at the Descent of the Holy Spirit on Our Lady and the Apostles at Pentecost.
