## February 10th 2008: The First Sunday of Lent



### The Temptations in the Desert

The Gospel speaks of our Lord's forty day fast in the wilderness before He began His public ministry. It is on the basis of this experience that we, too, keep an annual fast of forty days in preparation for keeping the Paschal Mystery, i.e., celebrating the Passion, Death and Resurrection of our Lord at Holy Week and Easter.

We fast, that is we do penance by depriving ourselves of food, drink and other good and enjoyable things, in order to arouse and express sorrow for our sins and to show the fruits of repentance—a growth in love of God and neighbour. Hence the call to practise almsgiving as an integral part of our Lent. If we only fasted without giving away the proceeds of what we do not spend on ourselves, we would not get any real spiritual benefit. We might grow in self-control, we might even lose a little weight, but we would not grow closer to Our Lord.

Now, of course, Our Lord did not need to fast for the same reasons as we do. He did not need to do penance and so that was not the reason for His fasting. He did not need especially to practise almsgiving at any particular time. He fasted for another vital reason: He did it in order to enter spiritual combat with the Devil.

This may seem strange to us. We do not associate fasting with spiritual warfare. We probably even expect that fasting should release us from exposure to temptation, or else why face it? We, of course, pray, as our Lord taught us, *not* to be led into temptation. But we are fallen creatures and temptation poses greater danger

of a different kind for us. Our Lord faced temptation not as *fallen* man, but as *perfect* man. Some might think that therefore He cannot have been truly tempted, but He was. He took on the wiles of Satan in the same condition as Adam and Eve before their fall. The difference was that He would have to conquer where they had failed.

Another way of describing Our Lord's temptations, therefore, is to see them as trials of strength of will. The devil did not yet know exactly how strong our Lord was. He already realised that he could not tempt Jesus to commit any typically human sin. Jesus was clearly out of the ordinary, with unusual powers. Could the devil fool Jesus into using those powers in a way that would ultimately neutralise their effectiveness? That is why the devil cleverly uses the words of scripture to try and cajole Jesus into using His powers to win support and approval from men. He might even persuade Jesus to be a great worldly ruler, though of course a "good" one rather than a tyrant. But how would that end? Would Jesus fall into that trap?

Jesus shows that He is aware of the subtlety of these "tests". He will not change stones into bread because, although He is very hungry, He knows that "man does not live on bread alone, but on every word that comes from the mouth of God". He will not perform a spectacular act like jumping from the very top of the Temple "protected by the angels at God's command", because He will not "put God to the test". He will not conform to Satan's rule over the world by "worshipping him" because "worship belongs to God alone". In these three ways, our Lord prepares Himself for the pitfalls of His forthcoming ministry, and especially how to avoid the danger of seeking human approval and admiration.

### Lourdes: 150 years

The Pope has granted the faithful a special Plenary Indulgence this year because of the 150<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Apparitions. In all churches dedicated either to our Lady of Lourdes, or, like ours, under her title of the Immaculate Conception, it will be possible to obtain a Plenary Indulgence—the complete remission of all punishment due to past sins—on the anniversary of the first apparition, that is, tomorrow, the memorial of our Lady of Lourdes.

As is customary, the Indulgence is obtained by going to confession on or soon before the day, and by 1) receiving Holy Communion, 2) praying for the Pope's intentions and 3) praying the Our Father, Hail Mary, Glory be to the Father and the Creed (I believe in God). **All of these, except confession, must be done on the feast day and in the designated Church.** If you have been to confession shortly before and are still in a state of grace, then there is no absolute need to go to confession again on the day, or in this Church.

**St Cyril & St Methodius** (d. 869 & 885) Brothers from Greece, Cyril became a secular priest and Methodius a monk; both were blessed with missionary zeal. They were sent to Moravia at the invitation of Prince Rostislav, who sought missionaries able to preach in the Slavonic vernacular. Their immediate success aroused the hostility of the German rulers and ecclesiastics. Candidates from among their converts were refused ordination, and their use of the Slavonic language in the Greek liturgy was severely criticized. However, the Pope intervened and the use of Slavonic in the liturgy was approved. Cyril died while in Rome, but Methodius returned to Moravia and was made archbishop of Sirmium. Despite the papal sanction the Germans contrived to have him imprisoned, and, though released two years later, his effectiveness appears to have been blocked. His last years were spent translating the Bible and ecclesiastical books into Slavonic. His influence spread to Bulgaria, Serbia, and Russia, where the southern Slavonic of Cyril and Methodius is still the liturgical language of both Roman Catholic and Orthodox churches. The **Cyrillic alphabet** used in those countries today is traditionally ascribed to St. Cyril. Pope John Paul II, himself a Polish Slav, declared them co-patrons of Europe.
