

THE FORTY HOURS

The Sanctuary has now returned to normal after the grandeur of the Forty Hours. Yet all is not the same as it was. For the graces that were given to all who took part in those two days of adoration are still alive and, God willing, producing a rich crop in our lives as individuals and as a Parish. How wonderful it will be if everyone who came last week to worship Our Lord and to pray for the many intentions we have might find a deeper sense of wonder and gratitude and awe in the presence of the Blessed Sacrament from now on! How wonderful, too, if everyone could now receive the same Lord in Holy Communion with even greater reverence and thankfulness to Him!

BR. LEWIS'S ORDINATION TO THE DIACONATE

Friday this week is a very important occasion in Br. Lewis's life and in the life of the Oratory, when Br

Lewis will be ordained deacon by Bishop Pargeter. Some of you may not know Br Lewis well yet, since he has spent most of the last few years studying in Rome. However, that will soon change, because Br. Lewis, as an ordained minister, will be spending more time in pastoral engagements.

The diaconate is the first of the three "grades" or stages of the Sacrament of Holy Orders. That means that a deacon shares in the graces of the Sacrament which is also received by priests and bishops. However, each of these three "stages" has its own particular character. The Bishop as a successor of the Apostles, has the "fullness of the priesthood". The Bishop has the authority to sanctify, teach and govern the church in communion with the other bishops gathered around the focal point of unity in the Church on earth, the Pope. Bishops therefore have the authority to celebrate all the sacraments and oversee the teaching of the faith throughout their jurisdiction. They alone have the power to ordain other men as bishops, priests and deacons. Priests share in this sacramental authority by the virtue of their own ordination, but in a more limited way. Priests are co-workers with the bishops especially in the governance and sanctification of the local units of the Church, the parishes. They have the most important of the sacramental powers of everyday Christian life: the celebration of the sacraments of reconciliation and, above all other, the Holy Eucharist. Which brings us to the Deacons, who are not ordained to priesthood, but, as the Second Vatican Council reminds us, "to ministry". Here is what the Council's Constitution on the Church, "Lumen Gentium" has to say about deacons:

"At a lower level of the hierarchy are to be found deacons, who receive the imposition of hands "not unto the priesthood, but unto the ministry". For, strengthened by sacramental grace they are dedicated to the People of God, in conjunction with the bishop and his body of priests, in the service of the liturgy, of the Gospel and of works of charity. It pertains to the office of a deacon, in so far as it may be assigned to him by the competent authority, to administer Baptism solemnly, to be custodian and distributor of the Eucharist, in the name of the Church, to assist at and bless marriages, to bring Viaticum to the dying, to read the sacred scriptures to the faithful, to instruct and exhort the people, to preside over the worship and the prayer of the faithful, to administer sacramentals, and to officiate at funeral and burial services. Dedicated to works of charity and functions of administration, deacons should recall the admonition of St. Polycarp: "Let them be merciful, and zealous, and let them walk according to the truth of the Lord, who became the servants of all."

Monday to Friday: Masses at 7.30 a.m., 12.45 p.m. and 5.45 p.m. October Devotions (incl. Rosary) at 7.45 p.m..

Confessions are heard from 12.30 p.m. and from 5.30 p.m. until the end of Mass.

Monday 12th October: Feria. (Green) Optional memoria of St Wilfrid, Bishop. October 18th: The Twenty-ninth (White) .

October Devotions at 7.45 p.m.

St Wilfrid (633-709) Educated at Lindisfarne and then Abbot there, he left for Rome to learn the rule of St Benedict. On his return, he founded a Benedictine and Roman monastery at Rippon and was appointed a bishop. At the Synod of Whitby, he supported proposals which brought the English Church into closer union with Rome.

Tuesday 13th October: Feria. (Green) Optional memoria of St Edward the Confessor, King. (White)

October Devotions at 7.45 p.m.

St Edward the Confessor (1004-66) The last Anglo-Saxon king, he was a humble man loved by the poor for his generosity to them. He founded Westminster Abbey under the patronage of St Peter (then the Patron of England) because of his devotion to the Pope.

Wednesday 14th October: Feria. (Green) Optional memoria of St Callistus I, Pope & Martyr. (Red)

October Devotions at 7.45 p.m.

St Callistus (Martyred 222) Little is known of his early life, except he had been a slave. His papacy was marked with controversy due to his gentle treatment of penitents who had committed serious sins. He organised the first Roman Christian cemetery.

Thursday 15th October: St Teresa of Jesus, Virgin & Doctor of the Church. (White)

October Devotions at 7.45 p.m.

St Teresa (1515-82) Born in Avila of a wealthy family, she joined the Carmelites. She was very concerned with the state of the Order, and amongst great opposition, she set about its reform with the help of the mystical poet-priest, St John of the Cross. A mystic herself, her books are still clearly readable, simple and profound aids to prayer.

Friday 16th October: Feria. (Green) Optional memorias of St Hedwig, (White); or of St Margaret Mary Alacoque, Virgin. (White)

October Devotions at 7.45 p.m.

St Hedwig (1174-1243) A queen of Poland, and renowned for her charitable undertakings, she founded a Cistercian convent which she joined once widowed. St Margaret Mary Alacoque (1647-90) In visions she received from Our Lord, He requested the spread of devotion to His Sacred Heart as the symbol of His love for us.

Saturday 17th October: St Ignatius of Antioch, Bishop & Martyr. (Red)

- Masses at 8 a.m. and 11 a.m.
- Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament from 8.30 to 10.45 a.m.
- Benediction at 10.45 a.m.
- Confessions from 10.55 a.m. to 12 noon & from 5.30 p.m.
- First Mass of Sunday (Twenty-ninth Sunday) at 5.45 p.m.

St Ignatius of Antioch (d. c.107) A disciple of St Peter before becoming Bishop of Antioch, he was captured and sent to Rome and martyrdom. On his journey, he wrote seven important letters which recount the Church's life and thought in those times.
