

### January 27th 2008: Third Sunday of the Year (Sexagesima)

### The People that walked in Darkness

After His Baptism, Our Lord began His public ministry by preaching in Galilee, called by the Prophet Isaiah the land of the "people that walked in darkness", on account of the fact that, although they were Jews, the Galileans lived beyond Samaria, whose people were apostates from the true Jewish religion, and worshipped false gods. So the Galileans were almost cut off from Judea and Jerusalem, the heartlands of the true faith of the Jews, the land of David and the city of the Temple. Our Lord is seen by St. Matthew, (whose Gospel we are now reading on Sundays in Ordinary Time), as beginning His public ministry far away from Jerusalem in His home district of Galilee, and gradually working His way down through Samaria towards Jerusalem where He will consummate His work by His Passion, Death and Resurrection. Yet it is of the "people who walked in darkness" that Isaiah went on to say that they have "seen a great light". This prophecy foretold that the Galileans would have the privilege of being the first to hear the Son of God preach the Kingdom in their midst and, indeed, Our Lord was known in Jerusalem as "the Galilean".

### **Follow Me!**



Right from the moment He began His ministry, our Lord did not work alone, but called others to join Him. We hear in today's Gospel how the first He called to follow Him were the fishermen brothers, Simon and Andrew. Simon was to become known as Peter, the "Rock". Then Jesus called another two fishermen brothers to follow Him: James and John, the sons of Zebedee-who was clearly a person of some fame since the evangelist not only gives us his name, but also tells us that he had men working for him as well as his two sons. Jesus told all four of these recruits that He would make them into "fishers of men". God does not call mankind without the assistance of men. Last Friday we celebrated the feast of the Conversion of St. Paul, when we recalled the momentous day outside the city of Damascus when the glorified Jesus revealed Himself to Saul, the Pharisee and persecutor of the Church, as the risen Saviour. Saul was baptised and became "Paul", the fearless preacher to the gentile nations of the known world. He became as passionate a worker for Christ as he had previously been against Him. Without Paul's wonderful work, who knows how long it might have taken for God's Church to be spread throughout the Roman Empire? Paul heard our Lord's call and followed Him faithfully, so wiping away the stain of having been a persecutor of the Church, and becoming its fearless teacher and defender.

### Sexagesima

The countdown to Lent and Easter continues today with Sexagesima Sunday which in Latin is the "Sixtieth Day". We can think about an aspect of our forthcoming Lenten penances. First, let us focus on the positive side: what should we *do* for Lent? It is important to remember that we should take on some extra works involving love of God and love of neighbour. Why not make daily Mass our aim during Lent? Or perhaps the Stations of the Cross, or weekly adoration of the Blessed Sacrament? Mass and Adoration are wonderful sources of grace and spiritual energy helping us to know Our Lord better and to put into effect our Lenten resolutions with greater determination. The Stations focus our attention on the redemptive sufferings Our Lord took on Himself for us all, and help us to learn to hate sin which brought those sufferings down on Him. What about family prayer? Our children can only learn about the meaning of Lent from us adults. Daily prayer *together*, however short, is a magnificent witness to them, and a means to help them to understand the importance and purpose of Lent as a time of penance to bring us closer to God and make us less "full of ourselves".

Then we should also think about some act of kindness or charity. What about generosity to the poor and needy? Of course we should give alms during Lent; but we should also look at ways of giving our time; leisure time is very important these days, even though we might complain that we don't have enough of it! Yet we should always have enough to give some to those who need some help: the elderly neighbour who is lonely or who can't do the shopping. Can you help? Again, children (under our guidance) can learn so much about solidarity with the needy from practical examples of what we *do*!

<b>St Thomas Aquinas</b> (1226-74) Born into a noble family, he was educated at Monte Casino where he showed great promise from an early age, both academically and spiritually. Against his family's wishes, he joined the Dominicans aged seventeen. After his profession, he studied in Cologne under St Albert the Great and soon became a teacher and writer, working at various universities including Paris, Rome and Naples. Despite his great learning (and, undoubtedly, he is one of the greatest theologians), he was a humble and prayerful man. <b>BI</b> Sebastian Valfré (1629-1710) Born N. Italy. Following his ordination, he joined the Oratory at Turin where he spent the rest of his life. He became the most sought-after spiritual director in the city, becoming confessor to the Piedmontese Royal Family. This gave him some influence at Court and enabled him to do much for the poor of the city. The Archives of the Turin Oratory possess some 22 volumes of his writings, including his 'Compendium of Christian Doctrine', a catechism organised on a question and answer basis, which became a well-used teaching aid, lasting until the introduction of the Catechism of Pope Pius X.
