November 2nd 2008: THE SOLEMNITY OF ALL SAINTS

CARDINAL NEWMAN'S CAUSE

Today, the Solemnity of All Saints, is especially marked for us at the Oratory by the celebrations connected with the translation of Cardinal Newman's remains. Over the last two days these have been beautifully displayed in the Upper Cloister Hall where many people have seen them and have prayed in their presence for the Cardinal's speedy beatification. Now, today, these remains are to be carried in solemn procession into Church, where they will be placed on a catafalque near Our Lady's Altar during the High Mass. This Mass is being celebrated at 11 a.m. today by His Grace the Archbishop, since it is to him that the Holy See has given a particular responsibility both to recognise and to oversee the care and display of these remains. At the end of Mass they are to be moved to St. Charles's Chapel, while a permanent resting-place is prepared for them.

As you will probably already know, there has been a great deal of interest in the cause of Cardinal Newman of late, and in the fate of his relics. That interest is reflected in the strong media presence at Mass today. The entire Mass will be broadcast live, and repeated later on, by EWTN, the American Catholic television company founded by Mother Angelica Rizzo.

For the present, that is until the Cardinal's beatification is announced by the Pope, these remains will be treated respectfully, but not yet given the honour due to the relics of those declared Blessed or Saints by the Church. That will finally come about on the day the Pope makes that long-awaited announcement, and even before the formal ceremony of beatification takes place. On that

great day we will at last be able to set up a shrine here to the "Blessed John Henry Newman". Please, therefore, continue to pray that that day may come soon.

MORE ON THE HFE BILL

Last week we thanked you all for having striven so hard to influence MPs in advance of the HFE Act, despite the sad fact that this wicked bill is still set to become law. It is therefore a matter of utter amazement to learn that a local Catholic School should be prepared to invite as Speaker at a Prize-giving ceremony, an MP who has throughout her parliamentary career persistently voted for abortion and against life, right up to and including every single aspect of the HFE Bill in the last few days. What is even more shocking is that this MP is a former pupil of that school. Far from being proud of such a record, the School authorities should be deeply saddened that one who passed through their school should now be a major opponent of Church Teaching and of innocent human life in the womb. Cardinal Newman was so devoted to truth that he suffered for his faithfulness to its kindly, yet demanding light. He championed Conscience precisely because of its inalienable rights over state manipulation. We need to educate the conscience of our children in the Truth. Truth belongs to God, not to the State. Cardinal Newman knew that Truth demands our love and total obedience. His entire life's work in education was designed to help people of all stations in life to recognise and respond to the call of Truth. A "Catholic" education that does not give priority to the absolute call of truth is a travesty. Having worked and prayed so hard against the HFE Bill, we musty surely now pray, and ask Cardinal Newman to pray with us, for those who have the great responsibility of educating our children in the Truth of our Faith today. We must also pray for the conversion of those who have abandoned the truth, especially when they mistakenly claim to be exercising "independent judgement". There is a Judgement, which is to come; and there is also a dire warning to those who corrupt the young: that it would be better that a millstone be tied round their necks and that they be dropped to the bottom of the sea, than that one of these little ones should suffer scandal. We ask you to keep this intention in your prayers. When we really pray, good things happen!

HOLY SOULS NOT YET IN HEAVEN

November is the month when we pray for the souls of those "who have gone before us marked with the sign of faith". In other words, we pray for those who have died in a state of grace, fortified by the Rites of holy Church. Yet even so, we do not presume that such souls enter directly into heavenly glory. Without being in any way pessimistic about our prospects of salvation, we should all be entirely realistic. Cardinal Newman's first printed sermon is entitled "Holiness necessary for future Blessedness", in which he states that "holiness, or inward separation from the world, is necessary to our admission into heaven, because heaven is not heaven, is not a place of happiness except to the holy." Holiness is not achieved simply by being reconciled with God at the end of our life. As Newman explains: "in the parable of the wedding garment...inward sanctification is made a condition distinct from our acceptance of the proffer of mercy, and not negligently to be passed over in our thoughts as if a necessary consequence of it; ... we must meet the bridegroom with the oil of holiness, and ...it takes time to procure it." So we pray for the souls of those who, though saved, still need to grow in holiness before being admitted to God's presence. This growth in holiness is the purpose and effect of Purgatory.

St Charles Borromeo (1534-84) Born into Italian nobility, his uncle was Pope Pius IV, who noticing his talents, appointed him Cardinal and Archbishop of Milan at the age of only twenty-two. Despite his youth, he became the most influential reforming bishop of his day putting into effect the Catholic reform initiated by the Council of Trent and despite his position of great power, he used it with humility, personal sanctity and unselfishness to reform the Church of the evils and abuses so prevalent among the clergy and the nobles of the times. He was much loved by the ordinary people of his diocese because of the great care he gave to the victims of the terrible plagues which swept through Northern Italy in the wake of warfare. He was a friend and admirer of our own St Philip .

St Willibrord (c.658-739) Born in Northumbria and educated at the monastery at Ripon, under St Wilfred, he became a priest and went to Ireland. Wishing to be a missionary, he left for Friesland (part of the Netherlands) subsequently being appointed Archbishop of the Frisians. Setting his see at Utrecht, his missions in Germany, Denmark and Luxembourg were very affective. He was renowned for his devotion, joyfulness and holiness.

Bl. George Napper (Martyred 1610) Born and educated at Oxford, he was imprisoned for the Faith for nine years before succumbing to pressure and abandoning it. However, he repented and became a priest at Douay. On his return to England, he ministered for seven years with great success. At the time of his arrest, he was carrying a pyx containing the Blessed Sacrament and was terrified of sacrilegious acts should It be discovered, but despite a thorough search in which even the smallest items, such as a thimble, he was carrying were discovered, the pyx and a small reliquary were not found. He was joyful at the announcement of his execution on a Friday, the same day as Our Lord's.
