## November 25th 2007: The Solemnity of Christ the King

### CHRIST THE KING

The Provost writes:

Last Friday, November 23<sup>rd</sup>, was the feast of Blessed Miguel Agustin Pro, a Mexican Jesuit who was born in 1891. He served in his country at a time when the Church there was suffering from a fierce persecution, orchestrated by a militantly secular government. (The events in Mexico form the backdrop for Graham Greene's famous novel "The Power & The Glory".) Fr Pro risked his young life in order to continue ministering the sacraments, disguising himself in various ways in order to evade capture. Eventually he was caught and was shot for a being a priest, declaring as he died: "Long live Christ the King."


Two years before Blessed Miguel's death, on December 11<sup>th</sup> 1925, Pope Pius XI, in his Encyclical Letter "Quas Primas", instituted the Feast of Christ the King. Pius XI was one of the great Popes of the last century and was strong in his denunciations of the growth of fascism and secularism. He wanted to reaffirm, through the establishment of this great feast, the fact that Our Lord is King over every human society – King not only of our soul and conscience, intelligence and will, but King also of families and cities, peoples and states, indeed King of the whole Universe. Pope Pius demonstrated – with Mexico and Soviet Russia in mind – how laicism or secularism, that is, the attempt to organise society without reference to God, leads to a catastrophe and to the ultimate ruin of what a civilised society should be. How prophetic Pope Pius's words were could be seen soon after they were written, and they have not lost the force of truth in the intervening decades. We only have to open our newspapers or watch our television to see just what the Pope meant: the attributes of Christ the King and of His Kingdom are ignored, ridiculed or – increasingly – actively opposed.

The magnificent Preface of the Mass for today's feast tells us what the foundation stones of the Kingdom are: truth and life; holiness and grace; justice, love and peace. We might think that only idiots would want to live without all (not some) of these gifts – and yet they do. Presumably no-one would vote to do without justice, love and peace – but the demands of holiness and grace, of an existence based on God's truth, God's life – well, that is something else and many seem to want to have little or nothing to do with it.

Christ the King is not like some fearful tyrant who seeks to terrify and subjugate his people. Christ the King reigns from the throne of the Cross, reigns in the glory of being the One who has destroyed the power of sin and death (those things which really subjugate and enslave us) and has called us into a Kingdom which offers us joy and blessedness beyond our imagining.

"Thy Kingdom Come" we pray in the Our Father, because we know that it is yet to arrive and fully manifest itself. But we ourselves – like Blessed Miguel – can make sure that Christ the King already has full dominion in us. We pledge ourselves anew this weekend to serve our King, to own no other laws but His, to refuse to be mastered by sin, to grow in His love and in thorough-going service of our neighbour, especially seeking to show him or her that to acknowledge Christ as King is to find true liberty. If each and every person were to do that, what a transformation would there be in our society today.

"Long live Christ the King" said the Mexican martyr. May that be our prayer too.

**Friday November 30th: St Andrew, Apostle & Martyr. Patron of Scotland. (Red)**

**St Andrew** ( 1.c.) He was the elder brother of St Peter and both were fisherman in Galilee. He was a disciple of John the Baptist and was the first Apostle called by Our Lord. After the descent of the Holy Spirit, he evangelised Asia Minor and Greece and was martyred, probably at Patras, by crucifixion on an "X" shaped cross. Tradition has it that his relics were rescued and shipped to Italy where they are enshrined at Amalfi. He is the Patron Saint of Scotland and also Greece and Russia.

**St Edmund Campion** (1540-81) He was born in London, the son of a bookseller and although his parents were Catholic he became an Anglican. His brilliant mind led him to a scholarship at 15 to St. John's College, Oxford, and he became a fellow when only 17. His brilliance attracted the attention of such leading people as the Earl of Leicester, Robert Cecil, and even the Queen, who intended him for high office. He became an Anglican deacon but had grave doubts about Protestantism and further study convinced him he had been in error. He went to Douai and joined the Jesuits, then went to Bohemia for his novitiate, where he taught at the University of Prague. Following his ordination, he and Father Robert Persons were the first Jesuits chosen for the English mission and they arrived here in 1580. He preached wherever and whenever he could, converting many. He also set up a secret printing press to issue propaganda against the government's lies about religion and as a result he became the object of one of the most intensive manhunts in English history. Captured in 1581, he was imprisoned and tortured in the Tower of London. His travesty of a trial is well-documented, including the fact that, while the jury considered their verdict, the judge had blood on his hands which he could not wipe away. St Edmund was hanged, drawn, and quartered at Tyburn together with St Ralph Sherwin and St Alexander Briant.
