

THE MYSTERIES OF FAITH



On Easter night we heard the majestic account of the Creation in the opening chapter of the Book of Genesis, culminating in God's exclamation: "*Let us make man in our image, after our likeness.*" In these words, God chose to begin a revelation of His own inner being that would eventually be accomplished in two great events: first, the Incarnation of the Son of God for our Redemption—which reached its accomplishment in the Passion, Death, Resurrection and Ascension of the Son; secondly, the outpouring of the Holy Spirit of God on the Day of Pentecost. Since Advent we have been celebrating all the events of our Redemption contained and revealed in these great events. With the coming of the Holy Spirit "to lead us into all truth" (Jn 16:13), God's revelation is now complete. He has now taught us the truth about His own self, first shown in those words of Genesis. There is but One God, yet there is not One Person

in that Godhead. God is One in nature and being and substance—but He is three Persons, each fully and equally God. The mystery of the Trinity, which we commemorate and celebrate on this first Sunday after Pentecost—having now celebrated the Paschal mystery of our Redemption through Christmas, Lent and Eastertide—is the "most ancient of all mysteries", and root of every other. The Trinity is the life of God Himself, the meaning and origin of His most wonderful love and His longing to share that love with His lowly creatures. Hence the hidden depths in that exclamation of the Divine Persons at the beginning of human history: "*Let us make man in our image, after our likeness*!" Yet of course, we must remember that the immensity of the created universe, however vast, is as nothing compared to God the Creator of all. The Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit never came into being at any moment. They are always simply and blissfully One God, without beginning or end, all-powerful and all-loving.

In today's Second Reading, St. Paul invokes the blessing of God in a way that suggests the unity and yet *complementarity* of the Divine Persons: "The *Grace* of our Lord Jesus Christ and the *Love* of God (the Father) and the *Fellowship* of the Holy Spirit be with you!" Not that any of these words is *exclusive* to each of the Three Divine Persons, yet each of them has a distinct role. The Father is the *source* from Whom the Son is "begotten". Even so, we must not think of the Son as begotten in time, *after* the Father. The Father is always "Father" because there is no moment when He does not yet have a Son. The Son is the perfect image of the Father as the source of the Godhead, and from the Son as the "best gift" of God to us. The Holy Spirit is the bond of love which so perfectly unites Father and Son that He is Himself a Person equal to them both in every way as God.

This knowledge of the mystery of the Trinity is God's profoundest self-revelation to us humans, a wonderful gift to His beloved creatures made in His own image. We should therefore reverence this mystery with deepest gratitude and awe. It is not to be treated as a puzzle to be solved, or to be over-simplified. The Mohammedans reject it on the grounds that "God cannot beget nor be begotten". Yet this mystery is not the product of either human ingenuity or intellectual confusion. It is the expression of the heart of God's deepest love for us and of His desire to share His very self with us —as He has shown us in Christ.

THE LIVING BREAD FROM HEAVEN

Following the Feast of the Trinity, therefore, we celebrate again the mystery of the Incarnation of the Son, not as we did at Christmas and Easter, when we recalled His historical presence on earth, but rather now in His continuing hidden presence in our midst in the Blessed Sacrament. This is the origin of our Solemnity of Corpus Christi, the "Body of Christ" given by Him to us at the Last Supper to continue His loving presence and work in His Church. All that Christ was in the Incarnation is still entirely present in the Eucharist.

Monday May 19th: Feria. (Green) Optional memoria of St Dunstan, Bishop. (White)

Novena for St. Philip and May Devotions at 7.45 p.m.

St Dunstan (d. 988) Born into a noble family, he became a Benedictine monk at Glastonbury and was ordained by his uncle, St Alphege. After his appointment as Abbot of Glastonbury, he developed the abbey into a centre of learning which also revitalised other monasteries. He was appointed Archbishop of Canterbury and fought hard for the rights of the Church. He also contributed to the rebuilding of monasteries, destroyed during the Danish invasions, and restored discipline in the clergy.

Tuesday May 20th: Feria. (*Green*). Optional memoria of *St Bernadine of Siena, Priest*. (White)

Brothers of the Little Oratory meet after Benediction St Bernadine of Siena (1380-1444) As a young man, he took over the running of the hospital in Siena when most of the staff died in an epidemic. His life then became one of prayer and service to others. He joined the Franciscans and after some years, became an itinerant preacher, especially spreading devotion to the Holy Name of Jesus. He was a popular and humble man, refusing requests to become a bishop.

Wednesday May 21st: Feria. (Green) Optional memoria of St Christopher Magallanes, Priest, and companions. Martyrs. (Red)

St Christopher Magallanes & Companions In the early part of the 20th century, the Mexican government was fiercely anti-Catholic. Fr Christopher, a native Mexican and a well loved priest, especially for his spiritual and practical help to the native Indians, was accused of plotting against the government and sentenced to death without a trial. He forgave his executioners and was shot. We also remember today twenty-six other Mexicans martyred for the Faith in the 1920s and 1930s.

Thursday May 22nd: Feria. (Green). Optional memoria of St Rita of Cascia, Religious. (White) Memorial of Corpus Christi Thursday (White)

• EXTERNAL SOLEMNITY OF CORPUS CHRISTI (See below): Solemn High Mass in the Extraordinary Rite, and Procession, at 8 p.m.

St Rita of Cascia (d. 1457) At an early age, she had a religious vocation but her parents insisted on her marriage. After eighteen years of marriage to an abusive man, he was killed in a brawl. When her (adult) sons later died, she joined the Augustinian convent in Cascia. She soon became renowned for her austerity, charity and prayer life. She is the patron of difficult marriages, and also of hopeless causes.

THE NOVENA FOR ST. PHILIP'S DAY, incorporating May Devotions to Our Lady, continues each weekday night, (except Thursday—see above) beginning with Rosary at 7.45 p.m. followed by a short reading on St. Philip's life, and ending with Benediction.

ADORATION AT REDNAL will take place this week on Wednesday commencing with Mass at 2.30 p.m. Weather permitting, there will be a Blessed Sacrament Procession around the grounds on this eve of Corpus Christi Thursday. *Please continue to pray that planning*
