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

February 15th 2009: THE SIXTH SUNDAY OF THE YEAR

TWO BIRTHDAY ANNIVERSARIES



Next Saturday is the 209th anniversary of Cardinal Newman's birth, which we will celebrate, as usual, on the feast of our own St. Valentine (see over the page).

Last Friday also saw another notable anniversary: Charles Darwin's 200th birthday. Much of the current celebration of Darwin's work assumes that his theory of evolution has effectively displaced the idea of creation by God. It is widely taken for granted that there are two, and only two, mutually exclusive ways of understanding the origin of the natural world: you accept either the *Bible's* account of creation by God, literally in six days, or *Science's* account of the gradual development of different species according to the principle of "natural selection". But it is an oversimplification to suggest that these are the only possible accounts for the world as we know it, or that they completely contradict each other. Charles Darwin, it is true, came to doubt the existence of God, but that was for personal reasons unconnected with his scientific work on evolution.

It is not a matter of "Science v. Religion" at all. Take the Galileo case as another example. He did not get into trouble with the Church for holding a theory which allegedly 'disproved' the Bible. No, his theory that the earth goes round the sun had in any case first been taught *many years earlier* by Copernicus, a Polish priest and astronomer who didn't get into trouble for teach

ing it! Galileo got himself into trouble rather for obstinately insisting that the Bible was "wrong". But Galileo's great contemporary, the Oratorian Cardinal Baronius, explained that the theory that the earth goes round the sun was not in any way contrary to the teaching of the Bible or the faith of the Church. How? Because, Baronius said, "the Bible teaches us how to go to heaven, not how the heavens 'go".

In the same way, Cardinal Newman was not opposed to Darwin's idea of evolution. To Newman, the *idea* of evolution was not contrary to the teaching of Scripture about creation. In his Essay on the Development of Christian Doctrine of 1845, Newman had shown how doctrines develop and grow organically over many centuries. If ideas can develop, why not species of animal and plant life? Newman insisted that "evolution" as such is not a problem for Christians. The difficulty and danger in the idea of evolution arises in the contrast between blind "Fate" and guiding "Providence". Is evolution just an accident, or is it somehow guided? Newman saw that the idea that "blind fate" alone explained the world was nothing new. He commented in 1861, less than two years after the publication of Darwin's "Origin of Species": "To my mind it is wonderful that able men should take for granted that the notion of fixed laws is a new idea of modern times which is superseding... the old idea of a Providence ... Why, it is the old idea of Fate or Destiny which we find in Homer. It is no new and untried idea, but it is the old antagonist of the idea of Providence. Between the philosophies of Providence and Fate there has been a contest from the beginning. Fate may have new and better arguments now, but Providence has been able to stand against it for 3000 years, and there is no reason why it should not keep its ground still, though the philosophy of Fate may still have followers." In other words, what is at stake here is yet again not "Science v. Religion", any more than with Galileo. What the Bible teaches is that the world has not been shaped by the blind forces of random selection, but has been lovingly and providentially created by God. Genesis does not set out to explain how God went about it, just that what He did, out of nothing, was all good.

COLLECTIONS AT MASS

After all, it's not only heating and lighting that have to be paid for, but other parish expenses such as wages for sacristans, porters on door and telephone duty, secretarial assistance, paper and printing, etc. Moreover, please bring your children up to understand the importance of this duty by encouraging them to put into the collection themselves. The Seven Holy Founders of the Servite Order (13th cent) These seven young men were members of well-known and rich Florentine families, but Florence at this time was a city of lax morality and corruption and so in 1233, they retreated to Mount Senario and started a community of mendicant friars dedicated to Our Lady, known as the Servants of Mary, ie. "Servites". Their first leader was St Buonfiglio. The order spread but did not arrive in England until the nineteenth century. The Servites were instrumental in spreading devotion to the Seven Sorrows of Our Lady.

St Valentine (3rd Century?) When Fr. Newman returned from Rome to England to found the first English Oratory, Blessed Pope Pius IX presented him with the bodily remains of St Valentine, an early Christian martyr buried in the catacombs. Little is known about St Valentine's life; Valentine was a fairly common Roman name, but we know that he was a Christian martyr from the manner in which he was buried. Cardinal Newman, like St Philip Neri, was devoted to the "primitive times" of the Roman Church and the remains of our St Valentine, which now lie beneath the altar of St Athanasius (near the pulpit), provide a bond with those early days of the Church. Since nothing was known about the date of St Valentine's death, the Pope gave Fr. Newman permission to keep the Feast on his own birthday.
