

March 15th 2009: THE THIRD SUNDAY OF LENT



"You shall not make my Father's house a house of trade."

ZEAL FOR GOD'S TEMPLE

In today's Gospel St. John tells us how, almost at the beginning of His public ministry, Our Lord entered the Temple of Jerusalem shortly before the Passover and found money-changers and sellers of cattle, sheep and pigeons going about their trade.

What were they doing there? All these things were in some way connected with the Temple worship: animals for sacrifice and money changers who converted foreign coinage into that the Jews used to pay Temple taxes and for buying what was necessary for sacrifices. Their presence was, therefore, in one sense, legitimate.

Yet Our Lord's reaction was shocking. He overturned the tables and whipped the traders out of the Temple, saying "Take these things away; you shall not make my Father's house a house of trade." Thus He claimed a special relationship with God, "His Father", and implied that He was acting on His Father's behalf. St. John tells us that His Apostles were witnesses to this and remembered the words of psalm 68:10: "Zeal for Thy House will devour me". This is significant, because psalm 68 is one of the psalms of the Passion, and so the shadow of Our Lord's future sufferings is already cast over this event.

The question is sometimes asked by those who would like to downplay Our Lord's divinity, "doesn't this show that our Lord *did* commit at least one sin—that of anger?" We must be careful to distinguish between *righteous* and *unrighteous* anger. Anger is not sinful when it is the right response to an injustice; the greater the injustice, the more justified the anger. Anger therefore

only becomes sinful when it is disproportionate or wrongly founded, say on selfish motives, or involves loss of temper.

So what is our Lord's justification for such a dramatic removal of these traders from their business? It is a radical response to the avariciousness of those who made a rich living out of the Temple cult. It can also be seen that Our Lord is pointing to a cult and Sacrifice yet to come, which will not involve such necessities: the offering of His own Body and Blood in the Sacrifice of the Mass.

Unsurprisingly, such a dramatic event at the very heart of the Jewish religion and national identity could not go unnoticed or unchallenged. Immediately the religious authorities demanded that Jesus show them a sign to justify His acting in this way. As elsewhere in the Gospels, when He was confronted by such a demand for a sign, He answered in a mysterious phrase: "Destroy this sanctuary and in three days I will raise it up." At the time, nobody understood what He meant. They reply in disbelief: "It has taken forty-six years to build this sanctuary, will you rebuild it in three days?" St. John, writing many years later, is able to explain that, as with the reference to psalm 68, this strange saying was prophetic of His own future sufferings, and particularly of His death and resurrection. Moreover, as Jesus had just claimed God for His Father, in this way He also claims a mysterious identity between Himself and the Temple. St. John recognises this when he comments: "He was speaking of the Sanctuary that was His Body".

Obscure and mysterious as it was to all those who heard it at the time, this saying was nevertheless not forgotten. After such a dramatic opening to His career in Jerusalem that is hardly surprising. After all, it is to be expected that Our Lord had made many implacable enemies on that day, who were only too happy to look for an opportunity to destroy Him, thus fulfilling His very own prophecy. Those words would be pondered and brought out once again much later at His trial before the High Priest as an accusation. St. Mark's account makes it clear that by the time of His trial there was at least one different version of what Jesus had originally said: "We heard Him say, I am going to destroy this Temple made by human hands and in three days build another, not made by human hands." (Mk 14:58) This version makes the association of Our Lord's words with His own body even stronger, though without the understanding of those who recalled it then. It also suggests that the Temple of which Jesus speaks is to be His mystical Body, the Church, which will be born from His side pierced on the Cross.

Wednesday March 18th: Wednesday of Lent Week 3. (Purple) Commemoration of St Cyril of Jerusalem

 $St\ Cyril\ (c.315-386)$ Appointed Bishop of his native Jerusalem at a time when the Church was fighting Arianism, his episcopacy was marked with struggles to defend the Church, not only from heresies but also in matters of jurisdiction. His enemies forced him into exile on three occasions resulting in more than 35 years as a Bishop away from his see. When he finally returned he devoted his time to reclaiming the city from corruption and disorder. He is renowned for his profound writings on Doctrine, particularly those addressed to new converts on the Sacraments .

Thursday March 19th. The SOLEMNITY OF ST JOSEPH (White)

• High Mass at 8 p.m.

St Joseph has been revered by the Church since early times, being described in the Gospel as "a just man" who accepted Our Lady as his wife, and the Christ Child as his son. Devotion to him in the West was promoted by St Teresa of Avila, and Pope Pius IX formally constituted him as Patron of the Universal Church. Amongst other patronages, he is patron of the dying on account of the likelihood that he died before Our Lord left Nazareth, and therefore in His presence and that of Our Lady.
