#### August 10th 2008: THE NINETEENTH SUNDAY OF THE YEAR

#### PETER'S FAITH IS TESTED

Our Lord's walking on the water is one of His most unusual miracles, since, unlike His healing the sick or raising the dead, this miracle is not done for any other purpose than *simply to prove His divinity to His disciples*. They are terrified at the sight of Him upon the waters of the stormy sea, and cry out in fear. Our Lord then calls out to them: "Have courage! It is !!".

How typical of Peter to be the first to respond with great enthusiasm and impetuosity: "Lord, if it really is you, then order me to come across the water to you." When Our Lord tells him "Come!", he sets off without a second thought. He is fine as long as he keeps his eyes and mind on Jesus. The moment he becomes distracted by the wind and the waves around him he suddenly loses faith and panics and begins to drown. However, this is the moment for an urgent appeal of faith: "Lord! Save me!" So Jesus

takes his hand at once and holds him, saying both in rebuke and in reassurance: "O man of little faith, why did you doubt?" Then, when He has stepped into the boat still holding Peter's hand, the Apostles prostrate themselves in awe and worship Him saying, "Truly You are the Son of God!"

#### **OUR LADY IN HEAVENLY GLORY**

Friday is the great Solemnity and Holiday of Obligation in which we commemorate Our Lady's triumphant entry, both body and soul together, into heavenly glory. For the remainder of redeemed mankind, death separates our bodies from our souls until the day of resurrection at the end of the world, when finally our bodies will be raised again to be glorious copies of Our Lord's own risen body—still recognisably our own, yet transformed beyond all the weaknesses and limitations of this present life, just as Our Lord's risen body was transformed, yet still ultimately one and the same after His resurrection as before.

Only for Mary, as for her Divine Son, has the resurrection already taken place without the loss and corruption of her body. The Church teaches that this special privilege belongs to Mary because of the peculiar sinlessness of her body as well as of her soul. By the foreseen merits of her Son's redemptive work, Our Lady was created free from sin. Just as her soul was prepared for the coming of her Divine Son into the world, so was her body prepared, too. Only a sinless body could receive Almighty God made man. Only her sinless soul could fittingly bring Him up in the world of men, and prepare Him for His divine mission as our Saviour.

Our Lady rightly enjoys the fullness of heavenly glory with her Son, befitting her status as the "New Eve". For although Eve was the "mother of all that live", yet together with Adam she brought sin and death into the world, which all their children share in. Mary, by contrast with Eve, is the "mother of all that live *in Christ*", who is the new Adam. As Eve shared in the guilt of Adam's sin, so Mary shares in the healing from sin and death brought us by Christ. Mary is the Redeemer's work of absolute perfection, for she is indeed the first of all the redeemed and a pattern for us all that we are one day called to follow. For when we contemplate the sinless Mother of God in glory we are contemplating the triumph that her Son's death and resurrection have brought to mankind, in which one day we hope to share in heaven.

Monday August 11th: St Clare, Religious. Memoria. (White).

Mass for the Beatification of Cardinal Newman at 7.30 p.m.

**St Clare** (1194-1253) An Italian noblewoman, she became a follower of St Francis at Assisi and was inspired to give up everything and devote her life entirely to Our Lord. When other girls and women joined her, they formed the first female Franciscan Order, the *Poor Clares*.

**St Pontianus** (d.235) He became Pope in 231, but was exiled to the salt mines of Sardinia by the Emperor Maximinus, where he died of ill-treatment.

**St Hippolytus** (d.235) A Roman priest, he was originally in opposition to the Pope as he thought him too lax towards sinners, and had himself elected as Antipope. Like Pontianus, he was exiled to the salt mines. He became reconciled to the Church and died a holy death. It is from him that we learn so much about the Church in the 3rd century.

**Bl William Freeman** (1558-95) From Yorkshire, he was educated at Oxford. The martyrdom of Bl. Edmund Strensham, at which he was present, led to his conversion and to he priesthood. He worked here, in the Midlands, for some six years before being betrayed, leading to his arrest and execution at Warwick.

Thursday August 14th: St Maximilian Kolbe, Priest & Martyr. (Red).

**St Maximilian Kolbe** (1894-1941) A Polish Franciscan, he suffered poor health, but despite this, he worked to great effect in Poland and Japan fostering devotion to Our Lady through the media. During the Nazi occupation he harboured thousands of Jews, but was eventually captured and sent to Auschwitz. In retaliation for the escape of several prisoners the Nazis condemned many more prisoners, chosen at random, to death by starvation. St. Maximilian offered himself for execution in place of a man who was overcome with sorrow at the effect his death would have on his family

**St Stephen of Hungary** (975-1038) was the first King of Hungary, having united the Magyar tribes under one rule for the first time. He was also a devout and committed Catholic and worked energetically for the conversion of his people to Catholicism, founding the archiepiscopal see of Esztergom and the Benedictine Abbey of Pannonhalma. The royal crown he received from Pope Sylvester II in 1001 remained in use as the Hungarian crown until the beginning of the twentieth century, last being used to crown the Bl. Emperor Karl in 1917.
