## December 9th 2007: The Second Sunday of Advent



### SPE SALVI—Saved by Hope

The Pope's new encyclical letter entitled "Saved by Hope", has just been published in time for Advent. He reminds us that of the three great theological virtues, Faith, Hope and Charity, Hope is probably the least understood nowadays. The Pope sees the problem in modern "individualism", especially in the so-called "post-Christian" world. We tend to believe that justice is something we human beings can devise and impose upon ourselves and . Rather than trust in God's power and love, we turn inwards towards human integrity and institutions. Then when these fail us, as they always do, then we lose hope. So we become prey to cynicism and despair.

In order to counteract this slide into hopelessness, the Pope rather surprisingly takes us back to the imagery of the Last Judgement, which is so often ignored today except as a subject in religious works of art. He reminds us that at the Last Judgement the real value of everything that has ever been done will be revealed, and so justice will be done. In one obvious sense this is frightening, as are the traditional artistic representations of the "Doom", (as our mediaeval English ancestors called the Last Judgement). The word "Doom" has remained in our language as suggesting final destruction, yet in origin the word means simply "Judgement". The Pope reminds us that, *for the faithful* judgement brings hope. Here he brings in the doctrine of Purgatory. Of course, he says, the Last Judgement will see the final destruction of all those who have worked against God and His faithful servants, but it will also bring about the final restoration of those who, during this life, have tried to love God, though imperfectly. God's forgiveness, says the Pope, does not wipe away the stains of sin and imperfection "like a sponge" wiping the slate clean, but by "fire", as St. Paul teaches us in the first Letter to the Corinthians (1 Cor 3:13). This idea is at the root of our understanding of "Purgatory", with which we are dealing in our current series of Advent talks. Purgatory is not principally concerned with *punishment*, as many have believed in the past, but with *purification* from the stains of sin which separate us from God's holiness. Hope saves us by teaching us that human history is not "doomed" to self-destruction, but that God has already definitively stepped in to save us in Christ. Christ's life, death and resurrection are the means by which we are saved from self-destruction and from the misery of the unredeemed human condition. In Advent we are reminded once again to refocus our whole Christian life on the image of Christ as the One who will "come again in glory to judge the living and the dead" and so bring justice and life to all His faithful. So we pray, "Amen! Come, Lord Jesus!" (Apoc. 22:20)

### OUR LADY QUEEN OF LIFE

It is through Our Lady that this hope has come into the world. Yesterday we celebrated our patronal feast of her Immaculate Conception. This means the creation of Our Lady without any sin. Mary is God's masterpiece. She is the "Mother of all who live", as Eve had been before her, but in a far greater way. For where Eve failed, Mary won. It might seem at first that Mary's freedom from sin would make her *less* free. For in our consumerist society we tend to associate freedom with choice, and the greater the range of choices we are given, the greater the freedom we have. We may therefore be tempted to think that because Mary was free from sin, this meant that she was *obliged* to follow God's will. But that is because our reckoning is darkened by sin. We think that freedom to choose means having many objects to choose from, and seeing them as all of equal value. But what if there is one *overwhelmingly wonderful object* presented to us that we have the power to choose or resist? Then we would surely and unhesitatingly want to choose it. So it was for Mary at the Annunciation. She was wholly free from sin and so was wholly free to see the *real worth and value of what God was offering to all mankind, so long as she agreed and accepted His invitation*. Hence Mary chose life—God's life. She gave her own created life to the Creator and He became her Son. This week we will celebrate Our Lady of Guadalupe, as she revealed herself to St Juan Diego, the Aztec convert (see the Calendar for Wednesday). There Our Lady freed her children from fear and desperation and gave them instead the Lord of Life. Please take a prayer card today so that we can pray to her for society to be set free from the despair of so-called "pro-choice" which merely means choosing death—and to find God's will and perfect freedom in choosing life, which is the incomparable good God offers us in each individual human being He creates.

### The FIRST WEEK OF THE YEAR: Liturgical Calendar

**Monday December 10th: Monday of Advent Week 2. (Purple) Optional memoria of St Edmund Gennings, Priest & English Martyr. (Red)**

- **Blessing with St Philip's relic at 8 p.m.**

**St Edmund Gennings** (1567-91) Born in Lichfield, he was a convert who studied for the priesthood abroad. On returning to England he sought out his brother who betrayed him. He was arrested whilst saying Mass and in mockery of his priesthood was dragged through the streets in his vestments. On refusing to denounce the Faith, he was thrown into a small hole until his particularly brutal execution. His brother converted after witnessing it and became a Franciscan, eventually becoming the Provincial in England.

**Tuesday December 11th: Tuesday of Advent Week 2. (Purple). Optional memoria of St Damasus, Pope. (White)**

- **Benediction at 8 p.m. Brothers of the Little Oratory meet after Devotions**

**St Damasus** (d.384) A Spaniard, though born in Rome, he was elected Pope in 366. During his Pontificate, Catholicism became the religion of the Roman state and his devotion to the early martyrs led to many previously neglected religious sites and churches being restored. He preserved the papal archives and commissioned his friend St Jerome to correct the Latin bible. However, his pontificate was not without problems and he had to deal with an anti-pope and the Arian and Donatist heresies.

**Wednesday December 12th: Wednesday of Advent Week 2. (Purple). Optional memoria of Our Lady of Guadalupe. (White)**

**Our Lady of Guadalupe:** In 1531, Our Lady appeared to St Juan Diego on the site of the Aztec Temple to *Tonantzin*, the "mother of gods". The Aztecs, resentful of the Spanish invaders, were reluctant to give up their idolatry and convert to Catholicism. But Our Lady said: "I am the perfect, forever Virgin, Holy Mary, Mother of the True God...He is the Master of Heaven and Earth". Her image was emblazoned on Juan Diego's cloak.

**Thursday December 13th: St Lucy, Virgin & Martyr. (Red)**

**St Lucy** (d.304) She was from Syracuse, an important Greek city in Sicily, and was martyred during the Diocletian persecution, the most fierce in the early Church. Her name is included in the Roman Canon of the Mass. She is the patron saint of the blind.

**Friday December 14th: St John of the Cross, Priest & Doctor of the Church. (White)**

**St John of the Cross** (1542-91) He was a Carmelite friar in his native Spain, and a friend of St Teresa of Avila. She asked him to help reform the Carmelite order, and he suffered much persecution by his community who were resistant to change. He wrote many mystical works including *Ascent of Mount Carmel* and the *Dark Night of the Soul*, and is known as the 'Mystical Doctor'.

**Saturday December 15th: Saturday of Advent Week 2. (Purple) Blessed Anthony Grassi, Oratorian Priest. Memoria. (White)**

- **Mass at 8 a.m. and Sung Mass at 11 a.m. (N.b. Advent talk afterwards)**
- **Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament from 8.30 to 10.45 a.m.**
- **Benediction at 10.45 a.m.**
- **Confessions from 10.55 a.m. to 12 noon & from 5.30 p.m. until the end of Mass**
- **Vigil Mass of THE THIRD SUNDAY OF ADVENT at 5.45 p.m.**

**Blessed Anthony Grassi** (1592-1671) As a young Oratorian at Fermo in Italy, he was nearly killed by lightning whilst praying at Our Lady's shrine in Loreto. Renowned for his serenity he was a sought-after confessor and adviser even to Cardinals. Despite his obvious humility, he kept the Oratorian constitutions, ensuring the community did likewise. He was considered to be truly like St Philip in all ways.
