

WHAT KIND OF MESSIAH IS HE?

Our Lord had not only to overcome the misunderstanding of His followers, as we heard a few weeks ago when many of His disciples refused to accept His teaching about receiving His flesh and blood in Holy Communion. In today's Gospel even the faithful St. Peter needs to be rebuked quite sharply because, despite his trust in Our Lord and his faith in Him as God's Son and Messiah, Peter still has some merely human expectations of what kind of Messiah Jesus will be. When Our Lord sadly asked His Apostles if they, too, would leave Him on account of His teaching about the Eucharist, it was Peter who spoke up, saying, "Lord, to whom should we go? You have the message of eternal life, and we believe. We

know that You are the holy One of God." Similarly in today's Gospel, when Our Lord asked: "Who do **you** say that I am?" it was Peter who answered immediately, "You are the Christ!", which means the Messiah, or "Anointed One of God". Then, now knowing that the Apostles, led by Peter, believed in His divine origin and mission, Our Lord began to teach them that, as the Messiah, He would have to suffer greatly and die a cruel death yet in the end rise from the dead. Peter was indignant, saying, "this must not happen to You, Lord!" Our Lord's reaction was to rebuke Peter severely before the other Apostles, saying, "Get behind me, Satan!", which means, "follow behind me, Opponent! Don't stand like an obstacle in my path! Your way of thinking is man's, not God's." Peter needed to be rebuked in the presence of the others because Our Lord had already made it clear to them that Peter was their leader. If Peter harboured a wrong idea of the Messiah, so would the others.

LIFE WEEK

Today begins our *Life Week*. Each day during the week the Oratory Primary schoolchildren will be running events to raise money for the work of Life and to help explain and understand the importance of that work both in the Church and in society. Life works to build up the Civilisation of Love against the constant encroachments of the culture of death. Each day from tomorrow until next Sunday inclusive we will hold the yearly "Siege of Jericho", based on the events surrounding the capture of Jericho by the Chosen People when they entered into the Land promised them by Almighty God after they had left slavery in Egypt. (see the Book of Joshua ch. 6) The people were ordered to follow the priests around the city walls once each day for six days and on the seventh to go round seven times in all with accompaniment of musical instruments. This brought about the peaceful surrender of that great city to the Hebrews with out the need for armed conflict. Our prayer is intended to bring about a change of heart both among those who seek and those who perform abortions in those terrible places of death. Please support this peaceful action of prayer and help eventually to bring about an end to this injustice. On the seventh and last day we will process seven times around the block on which the clinic stands praying and singing hymns.

On Friday evening in the Lower Cloister Hall Dr Carus and Margaret Parsons on Life will explain their work and how they help couples in practising NFP (Natural Family Planning) and in overcoming fertility difficulties. All are welcome. Leaflets explaining the purpose of the meeting and the work of Life are to be found at the church doors.

ST. THERESE'S RELICS

Next Saturday and Sunday St. Therese of Lisieux's relics will repose in St. Chad's Cathedral, attended by the Carmelite Sisters of her own order. There is a full programme of events throughout the day and night of those two days and details are available at the Church doors as well as on the Notice Boards. From St. Chad's the relics will be taken to the Church of the Sacred Heart and St. Theresa at Coleshill. Once again details are available on the same leaflets at the church doors.

St. Therese was personally dispensed by the Pope to enter Carmel at the early age of fifteen and died when only 24 years old. She wrote an account of her own life at her Superior's command. Because of its extraordinary profundity, Therese was declared a Doctor of the Church by Pope John Paul II. She had already been declared Patron Saint of the Church's Missions by Pope Pius XI on account of her dedication of her sufferings to the work of the missions in her lifetime. Let's make good use of her visit to Birmingham and ask her prayers for all our many intentions: the choice of a new Archbishop; the Cause of Cardinal Newman; peace in the world; the triumph of the Gospel of Life over the culture of death, and many others!

Wednesday 16th September: St Cornelius, Pope & Martyr, and St Cyprian, Bishop & Martyr. Memoria. (Red)

St. Cornelius (d.253) and St Cyprian (d.258): Christians were still enduring heavy persecution when Pope Cornelius was forced into exile which contributed to his death, thus he has always been counted amongst the martyrs. He had favoured gentleness and forgiveness to those who wished b repent of having turned away from the Church during persecution, a view disputed by several of the bishops of the Church. Cyprian, Bishop of Carthage, wrote on Church matters and supported Pope Cornelius' pastoral strategy explaining the divine origins of the Pope's role as head of the Church. Cyprian was martyred under the Emperor Decius. Both saints are included in the Roman Canon of the Mass.

Thursday 17th September: Feria. (Green). Optional memoria of St Robert **Bellarmine**, Bishop & Doctor of the Church. (White)

St Robert Bellarmine (1542-1621) Born at Montepulciano, Italy, he joined the Jesuits. He became an apologist (i.e. a defender of the Church's Doctrine). His advice to his friend Galileo, when he was confusing science and scripture was sadly ignored. He was a theological advisor to popes and is a Doctor of the Church.

St Januarius ((d.304) Bishop of Benevento, he was beheaded during the Diocletian persecutions. His remains were eventually enshrined at Naples, the City of which he is the Patron Saint. The liquefaction of some of his blood preserved in a small phial is a well-known miraculous phenomenon occurring every year on his feast day.

St Theodore of Canterbury (602-90) A Greek, he was educated at Tarsus before becoming a monk in Rome. At age twenty-six, the Pope appointed him to the See of Canterbury. Renowned for his charity, scholarship and pastoral zeal, he travelled the country and unified the Anglo-Saxon Church

My children, the Sacrament of Orders seems to relate to no one among you, and yet it relates to everyone. This Sacrament raises man up to God. What is a priest! A man who holds the place of God -- a man who is invested with all the powers of God. "Go, " said Our Lord to the priest; "as My Father sent Me, I send you. All power has been given Me in Heaven and on earth. Go then, teach all nations. . . . He who listens to you, listens to Me; he who despises you despises Me. " When the priest remits sins, he does not say, "God pardons you"; he says, "I absolve you. " At the Consecration, he does not say, "This is the Body of Our Lord;" he says, "This is My Body. '
