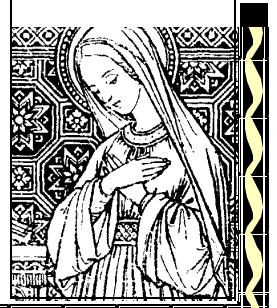

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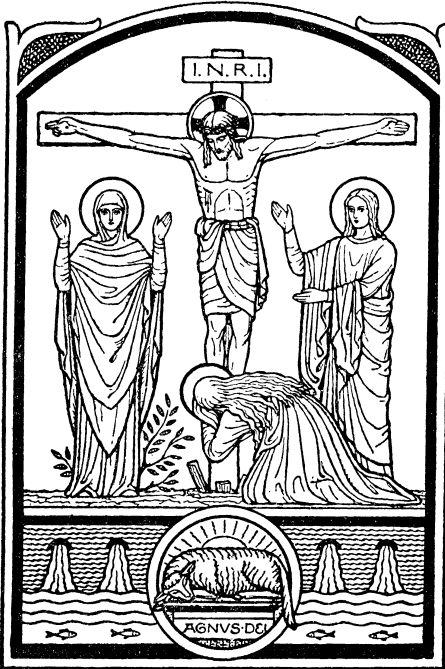

March 22nd 2009: THE FOURTH SUNDAY OF LENT (LAETARE)



THEY SPURNED GOD'S MESSENGERS

In today's first reading from the Old Testament Book of Chronicles, we are told how God "tirelessly sent messenger after messenger to His people, since He wished to spare them...but they not only became more and more unfaithful to God, but actually ridiculed God's messengers, despised His words and laughed at His prophets, until at last the wrath of the Lord rose so high against His people that there was no further remedy." So God allowed their enemies to burn down the Temple and demolish the walls of Jerusalem, setting fire to its palaces and destroying everything of value in it. Those who survived this disaster were taken off to captivity in Babylon for seventy long years of exile.

Our Lord told His contemporaries a story with a similar theme: the parable of the Wicked Tenants of the Lord's Vineyard. They, too, maltreated God's messengers, and even killed the Landowner's son. Their punishment was to be brought to a wicked end and see their vineyard taken from them.

We should not read these stories as something only from the remote past. They must apply to us as well. Our land had so many blessings, and yet we have squandered them. Once this was a Catholic country, then it cruelly persecuted the Catholic faith and people. Even so, the laws of the land were still basically Christian in outline until the later twentieth century. Since then, mockery of God and of his religion and of his representatives on earth has become all too commonplace. The Commandments are not only blatantly broken in law but aggressive, intolerant secularism, of which Cardinal Pell spoke recently at Oxford, threatens the freedom of conscience. At least until now it has been possible to claim conscientious objection to bad laws, but soon it may be impossible even to do that without falling foul of the law. For many years our country has ignored God's Will and even laughed at it, like

the Israelites of old. We may well be on the brink of some dreadful punishment for that sin, as the Israelites were. We must pray and work for a conversion of hearts and do our own duty as citizens in keeping our laws obedient to God's law.

THE CAUTIOUS VISITOR

We are told by St. John that Nicodemus was a Pharisee and a leader among the Jews, a member of the Sanhedrin (as Our Lord also states in Jn 3:10: "You, who are a leader in Israel...") He came to Jesus "by night", because he was cautious of the reaction of his fellow-leaders and Pharisees should they discover that he was an admirer of Jesus. What would they think of him not just for sitting at the feet of an unlearned Galilean carpenter, but even more for addressing the One who had driven the money-changers and traders from the Temple as "Rabbi"?

Our Lord tells Nicodemus that He must be "lifted up as Moses lifted up the serpent in the desert". This recalls a scene in the forty years journey of the Chosen People from slavery in Egypt to the Promised Land. This short distance took them so long to cover because they found it so hard to adapt to freedom and were in constant danger of abandoning faith in the One True God. One of their sins of complaint against God was punished by a plague of fiery serpents, recalling the connection between the serpent and Satan. Many of the people died from the bite of these serpents. Moses prayed for the people to God, who instructed him to place an image of a serpent, made from bronze, upon a tall staff and hold it up for the afflicted people to see. Whoever looked upon this bronze serpent with faith in God would be saved from the plague of serpents. It is significant that Our Lord sees Himself in the same way as the bronze serpent, lifted up on a staff. It is a prediction, although obscure, of the crucifixion. It also shows how Our Lord understands even at this early stage of His public ministry, that His death will be for the salvation of all who believe in Him. He goes on to instruct Nicodemus that God gave His only Son, just as Abraham was called on by God to give his only son, Isaac, as a sacrifice. But whereas God spared Isaac, He did not spare His own Son, but gave Him up for us all (cf. Romans 8:32). Nicodemus, having come in the darkness, goes away enlightened by Christ's teaching, and subsequently he bears witness to the light by taking care of the arrangements for Christ's burial.

St. Turibius died in 1606. Born of a noble Spanish family he became a gifted lawyer and a member of the Inquisition. In 1579 he was appointed Archbishop of Lima and spent the rest of his life as devoted pastor of his huge diocese. He defended the native population from cruelty and exploitation by the imperial establishment. He also baptised St. Rose of Lima and St Martin de Porres.
