DON'T GIVE UP PRAYING



Our Lord gives a very graphic image of persistence in prayer in the Gospel today: He talks about a woman with a claim against her neighbour who nags and hectors away until she gets what she wants from an unjust judge who is looking for an easy life.

Of course, Our Lord is not saying that this is how things *should* be. He is using this image to show that if we can get things we are entitled to by sheer perseverance, and from an unjust judge—how much more can we hope to get what we need from a loving and just Father, God our Lord?

However, Our Lord wants us to understand that, even though God is just, and loves us so much that He wants to give us what is necessary for our good, nevertheless, we too, like the woman in His image, must expect to be persistent in making our prayers to Him even for what is good.

Why should this be? God our Father and His Son, Our Lord, want us to pray not just to get what we want from

them *but because praying itself is a good thing.* Unlike the case of the woman and the unjust judge, where the pestering is only the means to the end she wants, prayer is totally unlike that. Prayer is the expression and the means of deepening a right relationship with Our Lord, and with our heavenly Father.

In his Letter to the Ephesians (ch. 6), St. Paul tells us that we should pray at all times. This is exactly what Our Lord means us to learn from this Gospel passage. Blessed John Henry Newman also taught about the importance of continuous prayer. He pointed out that prayer is like good health—you cannot be in it one moment and not in it the next. Health is a state of being. One can fall out of it, true, but one cannot *fall into* good health. Health is something that needs fostering and protection. It should never be taken for granted. A religious person, says Blessed John Henry, is one who prays, and prays constantly. Simply praying when we need something is not sufficient. We must pray at all times and not only for the things that we need, but to God's glory and for the needs of all the Church and those who ask for our prayerful support.

Today's picture comes not from the Gospel, but from the First Reading. It is an example of the importance—and the difficulty—of praying constantly. Moses knew that he must keep praying if the Israelites were to defeat their enemies and so move a step closer to the Promised Land. In praying he extended his arms, much as the priest does so often during Mass. Of course, he grew tired and his arms dropped to his side. Yet whenever he did this, the Israelites lost ground. In order to avoid this, Moses got his two closest co-workers, his brother Aaron, and his friend Hur, to stay at his sides and hold each of his arms when he grew tired, so that the Israelites could continue to benefit from his prayers for them. We should see our own prayer in the same light. We must pray constantly not only for our own needs but for the needs of all who ask us to pray. We are supporting them by our prayers just as Aaron and Hur supported Moses.

St Luke (1st cent.) was the only one of the writers of the Scriptures who we know was a Gentile, ie a non-Jew. He was a Greek physician and a follower of St Paul. He wrote the third Gospel and the Acts of the Apostles, which tells of the early growth of the Church and preaching of the Gospel throughout the Roman world after Pentecost.

Sts John de Breboeuf (d. 1649) & St Isaac Jogues (d. 1646) were French Jesuit missionaries in Canada who worked for several years with great success amongst the Huron Indians, having converted over 7,000. But they were eventually captured by the Iroquois, enemies of the Hurons, and cruelly tortured before being killed.

St Paul of the Cross (d. 1775) was the founder of the Passionist Congregation, which Blessed Dominic Barberi was eventually to join.

St John of Capistrano (d.1456) joined the Franciscans at Perugia where St Bernadine of Siena inspired him to foster devotion to the Holy Name of Jesus. He travelled throughout Europe and reformed the Observant Franciscans and the Poor Clares. When Sultan Mohammed II, who had earlier conquered Constantinople, threatened Vienna and Rome, he influenced the Christian powers to resist the invading Turks.
