June 22nd 2008: THE TWELFTH SUNDAY OF THE YEAR



CHRIST IS THE NEW ADAM

St. Paul in today's 2nd reading from the Epistle to the Romans contrasts Our Lord with Adam, the first man. Strictly speaking, Paul does more than contrast them; he explains that Christ is the New Adam. To understand what he means we have first to recollect what Adam is. Adam is the originator of the entire human race. We talk about the human race and mankind as a single entity. But we can only do this truly if we are all, ultimately, descended from one man and one woman. This is what the Church believes and teaches. There is no sense in speaking about the unity of the human race unless all human beings are actually of one and the same physical stock.

Because of Adam, we are all "men" by race. Because of the same Adam, we are all born alienated from our Creator by Adam's sin, also known as "original sin". "Sin entered into the world through one man", says St. Paul. Sin began as the rebellion of certain angels against God, Satan and his cohort of wicked spirits. Their hatred of God extends to all of God's creation and most of all to mankind, because, as we know, it has been revealed to us by God that we are 'made in God's image and likeness'. This image and likeness in us Satan has sought from the beginning to destroy. Hence his subtle temptation of our first parents. Since they were so close to God before the Fall, Adam and Eve could not easily be made to sin against God. But once they had been brought to disobey God, all subsequent sin became ever easier. So it is that Adam, Eve and all their descendents since the fall will find until the end of the world that it is very difficult not to sin. Moreover, there is a further dreadful consequence of sin, which mars God's image in us all-that is death. St. Paul explains that "Death has spread through the whole human race because everyone has sinned".

Into this state of alienation and death came our Lord. He is not only the greatest teacher the human race has known or can ever know—He is more: He is the originator of a new kind of humanity—redeemed humanity. As St. Paul says in the Letter to the Philippians, it was His "obedience even to death" that set us free from the vicious spiral of sin and death which ruled over us like a tyrant from the time of Adam onwards. The sin of Adam was disobedience which brought death. Only the obedience of the Son of Man, our Lord, to His Father's Will, could undo the hold of sin and death. Yet the fact that sin and death are still around is a sign to us how potent they are and how much we will always need our Saviour to break their hold over us! Again, St. Paul says in today's passage from the Letter to the Romans: "Adam prefigured the One to come", meaning that Adam himself was a remote preparation for the coming of Christ—because God has always had it in mind to send His Son to undo the harm of Adam's sin. Yet though sin and death are still so much in evidence in our world, nonetheless, St. Paul says that "the gift considerably outweighed the fall". In other words, Christ's death and resurrection did not simply reverse or undo the harm of Adam's sin, but far surpassed it in merit and power. St. Paul summarises this today when he says that "If it is certain that through one man's fall so many died, it is even more certain that divine grace, coming through the one man, Jesus Christ, came to so many as an abundant free gift." It is both the gratuity and the abundance of this gift that amazes St. Paul, and must amaze us too when we stop to reflect on it. God could have abandoned mankind as a failed experiment. Yet He chose not imply to rescue us, but to do so at the price of His own Son's suffering as the New Adam, and by that means to re-shape fallen man in His own Son's glorious image, making us fit by grace for the future glory of heaven.

St Ethelreda (also known as Audrey) (d. 679) An Anglo-Saxon princess, she was married and widowed. She had taken a vow of perpetual virginity, but was forced for reasons of state, into a second marriage. When her husband left her, she became a nun and founded a double monastery at Ely, where the Cathedral now stands. She lived an austere life and many miracles were attributed to her in her lifetime.

St Thomas Garnet (d. 1608) A secular priest, he was arrested and imprisoned for nine months before being exiled. He joined the Jesuits at Louvain, and returned to England in 1608. He was arrested almost immediately and charged with his priesthood He refused to take the oath of allegiance and was hanged, drawn and quartered at Tyburn.

Tuesday June 24th: Solemnity of the Birth of St John the Baptist. (White)

The Birth of St John the Baptist: We celebrate this occasion six months before the celebration of the birth of Our Lord and as the days begin to shorten. As St. John the Baptist said to his own followers: "He (Christ) must increase and I must decrease".

St Cyril of Alexandria: Patriarch of Alexandria in Egypt, he was appointed by the Pope to preside over the Council of Ephesus in 431. The Council declared Our Lady "Theotókos", that is "Mother of God". This condemned the popular heresy promulgated by Nestorius that Our Lady was the mother only of Christ the Man.

Saturday June 28th: St Irenaeus, Bishop & Martyr. Memoria. (Red) St John Southworth, English Martyr.

St Irenaeus (c 130-202) A pupil of St Polycarp, himself a pupil of St John, Irenaeus became Bishop of Lyons. He was the first great western Christian writer and his writings give clear testimony to the teachings of the early Church and of the Apostles themselves. His principal work was a treatise on Gnosticism, certain heresies which taught that it is knowledge, rather than grace, which saves us.

St John Southworth Born in Lancashire, he became a priest at Douay, returning to England in 1619 but was soon arrested. Queen Henrietta Maria secured his release and he was banished. He returned to England secretly and worked for some years, particularly with plague victims and the poor. However, under Cromwell's regime he was re-arrested and martyred for refusing to deny his priesthood. He was hanged drawn and quartered at Tyburn in 1654.
