One hundred and twenty years later, great crowds have assembled once again to rejoice in the Church's solemn recognition of the outstanding holiness of this much-loved father of souls. What better way to express the joy of this moment than by turning to our heavenly Father in heartfelt thanksgiving, praying in the words that Blessed John Henry Newman placed on the lips of the choirs of angels in heaven:

> Praise to the Holiest in the height And in the depth be praise; In all his words most wonderful, Most sure in all his ways!"

Confessions are heard from 12.30 p.m. and from 5.30 p.m. until the end of Mass.

Monday 27th September: St Vincent de Paul, Priest. Memoria. (White) • Holy Hour 8 a.m. – 9 a.m. • Rosary at c. 1.05 p.m. and c. 6.05 p.m.

St Vincent de Paul (1581-1660) Born into a poor family, he was educated by the Franciscans showing early academic promise, and was ordained at Toulouse at the age of only twenty. On a voyage, in 1605, he was captured by Tunisian pirates and after escaping dedicated the rest of his life in works of charity, extending to all classes of person. He was renowned for his humility, and is the Patron of charitable societies.

St Wenceslaus (907-929) As Duke of Bohemia, he strove to bring the Gospel to his people, but he was opposed by his pagan brother who murdered him.

St Laurence Ruiz & Comps (17th c.) A Manilan and a pious married layman, he accompanied a secret Dominican mission to Japan. A terrible storm forced them to land at Okinawa were they were put to death with horrible ferocity by the Japanese.

Wednesday 29th September: The Archangels St Michael, St Raphael and St Gabriel. Feast. (White).

The three Archangels are given special honour because they each are entrusted with a special ministry: **Michael** is the defender against the Devil; **Gabriel**, the messenger, was entrusted with the most important announcement ever made to a human being. The Incarnation of the Son of God; **Raphael** is entrusted with a special mission of healing and loosing mankind from the power of Satan, as told in the O. T. Book of Tobit.

Thursday 30th September: St Jerome, Priest & Dr of the Church. Memoria. (White)

• Holy Hour 8 a.m.—9 a.m. • Rosary at 1.05 p.m. and 6.05 p.m.

St Jerome (d.420) A learned priest, he compiled the official Latin version of the Bible known as the "Vulgate", and wrote many important commentaries on the sacred text.

Friday 1st October: St Thérèse of the Child Jesus, Virgin & Doctor of the Church. Memoria. (White)

St Thérèse (1873-97) "The Little Flower" was endowed with remarkable grace and knowledge of divine things from her childhood. She joined the Carmelites at an age well below the usual limit after personally obtaining a special dispensation from Pope Leo XIII. She suffered greatly and died at only 24, having written her remarkable autobiography "The Story of a Soul". She was declared a Doctor (i.e. teacher) of the Church due to her teaching of the "Little Way" as an available means to sanctity for all.
