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
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August 15th 2010: THE SOLEMNITY OF THE ASSUMPTION

OUR LADY'S GREATEST FEAST



WHAT IS THE ASSUMPTION?

In the first place, we believe that Mary was part of God the Father's plan to redeem mankind from the very beginning. This plan was to send His only-begotten Son – who is the perfect image of His own nature, co-equal and co-eternal with Himself – to become man "like us in all things but sin". God naturally wanted His Son to be nothing less than the most perfect of men, and to this end He chose Mary, whom He endowed with every grace necessary to be the Mother of His Son, to bear Him in her womb, to nurture and educate Him, even to share His burden as far as this would be possible. Yet she was not to be compelled to accept this awesome role, but was to be invited to do so. Since God foresaw that her Son would bring about an end to Satan's power and the reign of sin over mankind, He willed to give her especially the fruits of that victory from the very first moment of her existence. This is why we call Mary "The Immaculate Conception", since she was kept free from all sin by the merits of her Son foreseen by God in Christ's crucifixion and resurrection.

Mary, aided by God's grace, freely fulfilled all that was asked of her by God. She not only accepted God's Son as her own, but was the first and greatest of His disciples. She shared, as far as possible, in the redeeming work which her Son undertook. She pondered on God's words and works in her life; she pointed to Jesus as the One who could help when the wine ran out at the Marriage Feats at Cana; she ministered to Him in His public ministry, but most of all when she endured the horror of His degradation and cruel death on the

cross; afterwards she prayed with the Apostles and together with them received the Holy Spirit at Pentecost. With all this in mind, the Church recognises the unique, though also largely hidden, contribution made to our salvation by Mary the Mother of Jesus. Since we believe that God can do whatever He wills, we believe that, just as He preserved Mary from all sin, so too He preserved her from the punishment due from sin, which is death of the body. So, just as death could not hold the Son of God in its power (Acts 2:24) neither could it hold the sinless Mother who bore Him, since she too was sinless through His power and merit. So Mary is the first of all the redeemed to share the glory of her Son's resurrection.

WHY IS THE ASSUMPTION OF OUR LADY SO IMPORTANT?

The Assumption means that Mary is already fully in heavenly glory. Unlike all the other saints in heaven, she does not need to await the final resurrection on the last day. The Assumption may seem at first to set her apart from the saints and the rest of us, but that is not truly the case. She is the first of the redeemed. What she enjoys is promised to all the saints, all the redeemed at the end of time. We believe that in Mary God gives us a powerful advocate (as at Cana) and a loving Mother (as at the foot of the cross) filled with gifts of the Spirit (at Pentecost). Like her Son, to whom she is the closest of human persons, Our Lady is the "Holy One whom God would not allow to know corruption" (psalm 15:9-11). Our Lady's Assumption to heaven is the sign of hope to us that God's promise of eternal life will be truly fulfilled in a way beyond the limits of our imagination to grasp. May her maternal prayers help us all to keep our gaze focused on our heavenly home, so that "after this our exile [she may] show unto us the blessed fruit of [her] womb, Jesus"

St Stephen of Hungary (c.975-1038) As King of the Magyars, Stephen and his queen, Gisela, who was sister of the emperor St Henry, set about Christianising their people. He united the Magyars into the kingdom of Hungary and organised dioceses, also founding churches and monasteries, particularly the great Abbey of Pannonhalma, which still stands. He was renowned for his kindness and justice.

St John Eudes (1601-79) Born in Normandy. He was ordained in 1625 and joined the French Oratory. At first, he devoted himself to parochial work and risked his life caring for plague victims. In 1641 he founded the Sisterhood of Our Lady of Charity to care for prostitutes, and in the following year, the Society of Jesus and Mary (the *Eudists*) for the better education of priests.

Friday 20th August: St Bernard, Abbot. Memoria. (White)

St Bernard (1090-1153) was a Burgundian noble. At 22, he joined the newly reformed austere Benedictine monastery of Citeaux (the "Cistercians"), together with several companions. Blessed with great qualities of leadership, he was soon chosen to be the abbot of the new foundation at Clairvaux, where he remained the rest of his life. He attracted many devoted followers through his holiness of life and profound teaching. Renowned also for his wisdom, he was much sought-after as a spiritual director and counsellor by popes, bishops and royalty.

St Pius X (1835-1914) Born Giuseppe Sarto in Northern Italy, he became a pastoral priest, a seminary director, and bishop before being elected Pope in 1904. He devoted his Papacy to reforming the Liturgy, including a revival of sacred music, particularly Gregorian chant and polyphony. He also strove to overcome tendencies in theology which were dangerous to the Faith, known collectively as "Modernism", concerning the truth of Scripture, the nature of the Church and her authority, and the Sacraments. He encouraged the early reception of Holy Communion by children and more frequent Communion by all. A miracle worker, he was considered a saint even in his lifetime.
