# November 18th 2007: The Thirty-third Sunday of the Year



#### THE LAST TIMES—WHEN WILL THEY COME?

There's almost a feeling of "unreality" about Our Lord's sayings concerning the End Times of the world. Maybe we don't want to listen too closely to those words of His because they are, on the surface, rather frightening. It's much more comfortable to act as though the world is going to go one for ever. Yet, on the other hand, it can also be all too easy to assume that the "End is nigh", as some people, for instance the Jehovah's Witnesses, tend to think. Our Lord certainly wants us all to be ready for the End, should it come in our lifetime, but not to assume that it will come in our lifetime. "You know not the day nor the hour", He says.

### THE LAST TIMES—CAN WE ESCAPE THEM?

So if we find His words in today's Gospel reading disturbing, then that's as it should be. Our Lord never says anything for mere shock value. He has a good and serious purpose. This life is not for ever. Sooner or later it will come to an end for every one of us, young as well as old. What will happen to us after that? Our Lord came to make it possible for us to be forever with God in the bliss of heaven. Yet without His coming that could never have happened. We would all be lost for eternity. This is a serious thought. How often do we easily assume that we are all going to heaven because even if God does not exactly *owe* us a place in heaven, He is at

least good, merciful and forgiving? Yes, He *is* merciful, but the price of His forgiveness is the death of His Son. What can possibly be the cause of so great and terrible a price for our salvation? The answer is in one short word: sin. This does not mean that God extracts a kind of price for our sin, like a "fine" which we cannot pay and which therefore Christ generously pays on our behalf. It is far more profound than that. It is because sin is such a terrible disfigurement and wounds our nature so deeply that we cannot help ourselves out of it. We take sin lightly at our peril. It seems a fairly small and insignificant thing. Yet *all* sin is an offence to the infinite goodness of God. We might think that only really serious sins deserve damnation, but in actual fact, *all* sin deserves damnation.

That is where God's mercy shows itself to be so truly great. Because He might have abandoned us to our fate or even destroyed us. In the Book of Genesis the Flood from which Noah escapes alive is a sign to us of the meaning of God's justice. Yet God also shows His mercy when He freely invites Noah to find safety. The only price Noah must pay is the labour of building the ark and enduring the mockery of those who do not believe in what is coming—the Great Flood which will destroy them and their evil ways. For us, the ark of the Old Testament is fulfilled in the Church and her Sacraments. They are a free gift to us of God's mercy which enables us to build up the life of grace and to bring us safely through the destruction of this sinful world into the joy of heaven. Christ came to destroy sin and its terrible effects. This He did by His infinite holiness and love. It was love that made Him accept such a death! Without that love there would have been no merit even in His death, but His love makes our salvation possible. Faithfulness to Christ and His Body, the Church, frequent use of the Sacraments of confession and communion, and perseverance in love of God and neighbour will save us from everlasting death!

### THE HUMAN FERTILISATION AND EMBRYOLOGY BILL

Many thanks to all of you who rallied to Lord Alton's call to arms last week and wrote to members of the House of Lords to ask them to reject this dangerous Bill which aims to permit so much that is opposed both to God's Laws and to human dignity. We must remember to pray that the debate in the House of Lords tomorrow (Monday) may be guided by the Holy Spirit. There is a truth we can no longer hide from: powerful forces are at work in this country desperately trying to wipe out all trace of Christianity from the public arena. Some MPs and Lords actually believe that no religious-based argument in favour of life should even be allowed to be aired in a debate, let alone considered seriously. That kind of bigoted intolerance must be resisted firmly. That is why we must pray especially for Lord Alton and all who, along with him in the two Houses of Parliament, have constantly to face blind hatred of God and of all who believe and trust in Him and respect His laws. Our Lord gives His followers great courage and confidence when He says today: "You will be hated by all men on account of my name, but not a hair of your head will be lost. Your endurance will win you your lives."

Wednesday November 21st: The Presentation of the Blessed Virgin Mary. Memoria. (White).

The Presentation of the Blessed Virgin Mary: Though not recorded in the Scriptures, this event has a long history, especially in the Eastern Church. It beautifully commemorates the welcoming of the infant Virgin Mary into God's Temple in Jerusalem as part of her preparation for the Incarnation of Our Lord.

Thursday November 22nd: St Cecilia, Virgin & Martyr. Memoria (White)

St Cecilia (2nd-3rd century) One of the most famous of the early martyrs, a great deal of legend surrounds St Cecilia, but little is actually known. What we do know is that her remains are below the High Altar of the beautiful basilica dedicated to her in Trastevere, reputedly the site of her noble family's palace in Rome. She is the patron saint of musicians and her name is included in the Roman Canon of the Mass.

Friday November 23rd: Feria. (Green) Optional memorias of St Clement I Pope & Martyr. (Red); or of **St Columban**, Abbot. (White)

Stations of the Cross for the Holy Souls at 8 p.m.

St Clement (d. c.101) The third successor to St Peter, Pope Clement I governed the Church for about ten years and St Irenaeus says that Clement had seen and consorted with the Apostles. One of the most important documents of the early Church is a letter he wrote to the Church in Corinth to settle some disputes. He is venerated as a martyr and is included in the Roman Canon.

**St Columban** (c.543-615) He went from his Irish monastery with twelve companions on a mission to Europe and was very successful, quickly founding three monastic centres in France. Due to his criticism of lax bishops and of the immorality of the royal court, he was forced to travel, but continued in his mission along the way. He was eventually given land at Bobbio in Italy, and began the foundation of a great abbey in 614. He died there the following year.

**St Andrew Dung-Lac & Comps** (16th—19th cents) We commemorate the first Catholic martyrs in Vietnam. St Andrew was one of ninety-six native Vietnamese who were canonised in 1988. Another twenty-one canonised at the same time were missionaries from Spain and France. In all, over 300,000 Catholics have been martyred in Vietnam since the 16th century.
