

July 19th 2009: THE SIXTEENTH SUNDAY OF ORDINARY TIME

The Provost writes:

"FOR HE IS OUR PEACE".



These days from mid-July and through the month of August are, for many of us, the time of year when we seek to go on holiday. It is an opportunity, whether with our family or with friends, to take some time to be away from the daily round of work and school and find for ourselves often much needed rest and recreation. For many, with the effects of the recession being felt, this year's holidays may well be spent nearer home (the Americans have a word for this: t's a "staycation"!) but even this should still be a valuable time.

Rest for our bodies should bring with it rest and recreation for our souls as well. We need both so that we might be restored to both physical and spiritual vitality, in order that we might better fulfill the tasks God has given us. We find echoes of all this in this Sunday's Gospel: "You must come away....and rest for a while" Our Lord tells the apostles. His disciples were overworked, tired, hungry – they needed to recuperate for a while. Even so, when they reached the place Our Lord thought would be deserted, the people had got there before Him and so He had to continue "to teach them at some length".

The lessons here for us are many. Firstly, we do not go on holiday to get away from our Saviour: He goes with us, that we might try to draw refreshment from Him. "He is our peace" as St Paul tells us in this Sunday's Second Reading, and we will not find true peace, true happiness, true rest, if we look for these things apart from Him. This is what our own St Philip also taught his followers. It is so easy for us to wander about in

ignorance, seeking nourishment for our spirits where none is to be had, until we re alise that only the Good Shepherd can give us the compassionate care we really need.

Secondly, we learn from this Gospel that we are never on holiday from our faith. We do not go on holiday in order not to go to Mass, not to say our prayers or to pretend we are not Catholics. Just as on arriving Our Lord felt moved to teach the crowds once more, so when we are away from our usual environs, we might find an opportunity given us to bear witness to Christ to others, or perhaps we might come across someone whom we can help to find peace or direction in their lives. In that sense we are never "on holiday" - we are always ready to do something for our Redeemer and for the sheep He came to save. True compassion is always available – we don't leave it at home while we are away!

BEATIFICATION NEWS:

Several Internet sites this week have already decided the date and place of our Cardinal's Beatification. Suffice to say that this is news to us! The procedures indicate that the Oratory, in conjunction with our Bishops, must present a possible date and place to the Vatican for their approval. As most of the Vatican departments are now in holiday mode, it is not really likely that any decision will be made just yet. When it is, we will let you know straight away!

Some of the greatest interest in the forthcoming Beatification has come, of course, from the Oratories around the world. We have had many congratulatory messages and many Fathers have already indicated that they hope to be present with some of the people from their parishes. It is perhaps appropriate that we have staying with us for a few weeks two members of a prospective Oratory in Cincinnati in the USA. They are called Fr Lawrence and Brother John. Please pray for them and for the success of their venture – and say hello to them should you come across them during their visit!

Exposition on Saturday: 8.30–10 45 a.m. Confessions are heard from 12.30 p.m. and from 5.30 p.m. until the end of Mass. Monday 20th July: Feria. (Green) Optional memoria of St Apollinaris, Bishop & July 26th: Seventeenth Sunday of the Martyr. (Red)

Blessing with St Philip's relic at 8 p.m.

St Apollinaris (1st cent) From Antioch, Turkey, he was probably a disciple of St Peter's and became the first Bishop of Ravenna in Italy. During the persecutions under the Emperor Vespasian, he was set upon by a mob and died shortly after.

Tuesday 21st July: Feria. (Green) Optional memoria of St Laurence of Brindisi, Priest. (White)

Benediction at 8 p.m.

St Laurence of Brindisi (1559-1619): Born near Naples, he joined the Capuchin Franciscans studying at the University of Padua, where he also acquired a number of languages. A gifted theologian, he had great success preaching in Northern Italy and had similar successes after being assigned to work with Jews and Lutherans. In 1601, as chaplain to the forces fighting invading Turks, he led the troops into battle holding a crucifix and the resulting victory was attributed to this. He served as a peacemaker in several disputes between royal families in Europe.

Wednesday 22nd July: St Mary Magdalene. Memoria. (White)

St Mary Magdalene: St Luke's Gospel tells us that Our Lord drove out seven devils from her and that she became one of His most devoted followers. Present at the foot of the Cross she was the first person to whom Our Lord appeared following the Resurrection.

Thursday 23rd July: St Bridget of Sweden, Patroness of Europe. Feast. (White)

St Bridget of Sweden (1303-73): Of Swedish royal blood she was married at 13 and had eight children. Following her husband's death she founded the Order of the Holy saviour—the Bridgettines at Vadstena which became an important religious centre. She was a visionary and lived an austere life ministering to the needy. She became an adviser to the Pope, insisting on the restoration of the papacy to Rome from Avignon.

Friday 24th July: Feria. (Green). Optional memoria of St Sharbel Makhluf, Priest. (White) St John Boste, English Martyr.

St Sharbel Makhluf (d.1898): Son of a Lebanese mule driver, he became a monk. He was devoted to the Blessed Sacrament and was renowned for his holiness and austerity, living the last 25 years of his life as a hermit.

St John Boste (d. 1594) An Anglican minister and fellow of Queens College, Oxford he converted and became a priest. He was so successful in his work, he became the object of a massive manhunt but he was betrayed by an apostate Catholic who tricked him by requesting the Sacraments. He was tortured then hanged, drawn and quartered.
