June 1st 2008: THE NINTH SUNDAY OF THE YEAR

"LORD, LORD!"



Today we return to the cycle of readings from St. Matthew's Gospel that we interrupted since Lent. Our Lord warns against shallow, or insincere, discipleship. It is not enough to call Him "Lord", nor even to work miracles in His name! To be worthy of Him we must "*do the will of His Father in heaven*". It is a fitting moment to examine our consciences and ask: Do we really do enough to show that we are Christ's disciples? How do we witness to Him in our daily lives? No one can possibly claim that there is nothing that he or she can do—we live in a time when fewer and fewer people know or respect anything about Christ and His Church. How will they find out these things if we do not help them? Here's one way how...

JERICO AND LIFE

Last week Truth suffered a massive blow in the House of Commons when all pro-life amendments to the *Human Fertilisation and Embryology Bill* were voted out. On all four crucial issues - the need for a father; the creation of "saviour siblings"; the creation of human/animal hybrid embryos; the lowering of the time limit for abortion—all were lost. Of course it did not help that the Government imposed a whip, but it is clear that even without a whip, there is now a massive anti-life and indeed anti-Christian bloc in Parliament which ignores and despises all religious groups or arguments.

It would be all too easy to be despondent in the face of this defeat and shake our heads and say, "We've tried our best; God can't ask any more of us in fairness, can He?" Well. God can, and often in such circumstances God *does* ask us not just to continue, but to *redouble* our efforts. That is what Bishop O'Donoghue has done in a magnificent statement in the wake of the HFE vote last week. The Bishop points out the dishonesty of the supporters of the HFE Bill: "*as I understand it, there is not a shred of scientific evidence to support those who promote the benefits of creating human-animal hybrids. What we witnessed in the votewas a partisan act of faith that experimentation will at some distant time result in cures for Alzheimer's, MS and other diseases*". When it comes to abortion, he deals crisply with the principle of the "ability to survive independently" as the criterion determining the time limit for killing a baby: "*It's farcical to think that the definition of a human person depends on being able to exist on one's own. Human life is a series of inter-related dependencies at all stages of our existence.*"

What has this to do with Jericho? As you will see on the other side of this Newsletter, we are once again supporting a wonderful act of prayer and witness outside our local abortion factory. The "Siege of Jericho", which will take place in the week June 9th to 15th, is named after the famous events described in chapter 6 of the Book of Joshua when the Israelites conquered the great city of Jericho by prayer and hymns rather than by weapons. The children of Israel were understandably cowed by the enormity of the task before them; Jericho was a mighty city, well defended. Yet they put their trust not in their own prowess but in God, and so they won. We also adopt the same method with regard to abortion—a mighty a powerful industry that seems impregnable. But by God's power, which no darkness can withstand, the victory shall be won. We must not lose heart now. Remember the great Wilberforce, whose victory in Parliament over the slave trade was won 200 years ago this year. Don't forget this was not won easily or quickly. Wilberforce endured years of discouragement and opposition. Yet he believed that God wanted him to continue fighting against huge odds. Only after a huge struggle was his faith in God rewarded. Let Bishop O'Donoghue's stirring words give us a similar courage and determination: "*During the 19th century, slave-ers said black people weren't human. They were wrong. During the 20th century, the Nazis said Jews weren't human. They were wrong. Since 1967, the House of Commons has said the unborn are not human. They, too, are wrong.*" indeed, it is becoming clear that the Commons are out of touch with many of our fellow citizens' attitudes to these massively important issues. Yet MPs are answerable to us, the electors. A General Election will be at most three years away, possibly less. We must be ready to test candidates on these issues, even to stand ourselves. Wilberforce never gave up his struggle. Neither must we.

They were martyred during the Diocletian persecutions in c. 304. Little is known of them but it is said that Pope St. Damasus recounted that he had heard of these two martyrs from their executioner who converted following their deaths. <p>Tuesday June 3rd: St Charles Lwanga and Companions, Martyrs. Memoria. (Red)</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Benediction at 8 p.m. Brothers of the Little Oratory meet after Benediction <p>St Charles Lwanga & Companions (d.1885-87), the Proto-martyrs of Black Africa: In the first six years of their missions in Uganda, the White Fathers had significant success. Many of the converts were members of the court of the violent paedophile King, Mwanga. Fr Charles took over the care of the Christians at court, keeping the young boys away from the king, but when he discovered this, he gathered all the Christians and ordered that they renounce their religion. None of the fifteen young men (all under 25) would do so. They were executed, with Fr Charles, almost all being burned alive. He joined the Benedictines and was a teacher, compiling the first Latin grammar in England. He elected to go as a missionary to Germany, and when he was appointed Archbishop of Mainz, he took the name "Boniface" as a pledge of his loyalty to the Pope. His reputation was that of a holy and lovable man who worked tirelessly. Religious.</i> (White)</p> <p>St Norbert (1080-1134): A German noble, he lived a worldly life until a riding accident led to a major conversion. He became a priest then gave his possessions to the poor and became an itinerant preacher, in response to his earlier life, taking the most difficult routes—even walking barefoot in ice and snow. He had great success in his missions, particularly in Northern France where he started a community of Canons Regular—the <i>Premonstratensians</i> or <i>Norbertines</i>. He was a reformer which made his appointment as Bishop of Magdeburg unpopular but despite attempted assassinations, he was undeterred.
