

November 23rd 2008: THE SOLEMNITY OF CHRIST THE KING



HE WILL COME AGAIN IN GLORY AS JUDGE

What are we really thinking when, week after week, we say in the Creed: "He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and His Kingdom will have no end"? How do these words affect what we do and believe <u>right now</u>? There are many people who have a great respect for the historical Jesus. They revere His noble character, they study and admire His teachings, they approve His courage and wisdom, but they do not worship Him as God.

Does it matter? Many people would say "No". They argue that it cannot make any difference to Our Lord's message whether or not you believe that He was God. His teaching stands on its own merits. His command to love our neighbour is just as good whether or not He is God.

But for us, this question whether Jesus is God is crucial. It *does* matter that Jesus was, or rather, *is* God. It matters, not because this makes His teaching more true than it might be if He were not God—but because as God He has ultimate authority both to teach us and to judge us. Since He is God and our Creator, He has the right, without any permission of ours, to judge us. We did not ask to be made. We had no choice about it. Yet here we have been put in this world, and if we are wise we will understand that there are only two real possible reactions to that fact: we either *accept* that we are under the authority of Our Lord God, our Creator, Redeemer and Judge, or else we *reject* all that Christ has done for us. When the time comes, we will not ask or even consent to be judged. It will happen, willy-nilly. Those who reject Christ will be condemned by Him *eternally*. That word "*eternally*" is not a figure of speech. It really does mean *for ever*. His kingdom will have no end. Neither will hell. Do we ever stop and think that we could be condemned to the "everlasting punishment" He talks about in today's Gospel? Unless we recognise that the possibility of condemnation exists for us, we run the serious danger of not taking our eternal destiny seriously enough.

So the question of Our Lord's divinity is far from being a side issue. It is central not just to understanding Him, but to understanding ourselves. What shall we be for all eternity? Shall we be God's Friends, fulfilling all that God ever intended us to be? Or shall we be His foes for ever, frustrated and full of hatred for God, ourselves and everything around us?

Put like that, we might think "Of course I don't want to be God's enemy for ever! No doubt about it, I want to go to heaven." Yet it's not as simple as that. Think carefully about Our Lord's words in the Gospel: "Come, you whom my Father has blessed. Take for your heritage the kingdom prepared for you since the foundation of the world. For I was hungry and you gave me food..." In other words, whenever we put ourselves out to help anyone in any kind of need, when we sacrifice our own liberty, time, expertise and property to come to the help of the helpless, we are really doing it to Christ. He, the King, identifies Himself totally with the poor, the despised, the suffering, the helpless. He gives us the chance to show that we love Him by loving those whom the world despises.

Love means more than good will. St. James tells us in his epistle: "If one of the brothers or one of the sisters is in need of clothes and has not enough food to live on, and one of you says to them, 'I wish you well; keep yourself warm and eat plenty', without giving them these bare necessities of life, then what good is that?" (James 2:14-16) Love is costly. Look what it cost Our Lord. That is what we need to remember and to do if we wish to enter heaven.

Practical love means more than affection. "If you love only those who love you, what thanks can you expect?" says Our Lord (Mt 5:46). We cannot expect to be able to get to heaven if we have only shown love to those whom we get on with, or find it easy to like.

While this life lasts, and *only* while it lasts, we have so many opportunities to do good to others. As St. Paul says: "We must never tire of doing good because if we do not give up the struggle we shall get our harvest at the proper time. While we have the chance, we must do good to all..." (Galatians 6:9-10) Even so, there are certain priorities we must observe. As St. Paul goes on to make clear: "...we must do good to all, <u>and especially to our brothers in the faith</u>." This means that while we should be charitable to all in need, we have a **particular duty to those of our own faith** who are in great need. This is why we at the Oratory have always given such strong support to "Aid to the Church in Need", that wonderful organisation which gives both spiritual and material assistance to Catholics throughout the world who are deprived of food, clothing, shelter, work, places of worship and even life itself on account of their faithfulness to Christ. As St. Paul makes clear, we owe a special debt of charity to those Catholics who suffer in ways that we do not, so that by their grateful prayers, we may be given graces which they enjoy, and so often we in the rich West do not.

St Andrew Dung-Lac & Comps (16th-19th Cents.) Born in Vietnam in 1785, and martyred for the Faith in 1839, he was canonised by Pope John Paul II in 1988, together with 95 other native Vietnamese and 21 missionaries from Spain and France. We commemorate today over 300,000 Catholics, martyred in Vietnam since the 16th century.

St Catherine of Alexandria (4th c.) Little is known of St Catherine. Tradition has it that she was born into a noble family in Alexandria and became a convert. Her wisdom and knowledge led to the conversion of many, including pagan philosophers, and for this reason she is honoured as the patron of philosophers and preachers. She was martyred on a spiked wheel, the original *Catherine Wheel*. Legend has it that after her death, angels brought her body from Alexandria to the monastery named after her at Sinai.
